ARTILLERY UNITS WERE INSPECTED BY NEW G. O. C.

The 6th Siege Battery, C. G. A., turned out last evening at the Armory and was inspected by Colonel John Houlton, D. S. O., new G. O. C. of Military District No. 7, succeeding Colonel A. T. Ogilvie, retired. Accompanying Colonel Houlton were Lieut. Col. H. C. Sparling, D. S. O., Lieut. Col. A. H. Powell, and Lieut. Col. Norman P. MacLeod, M. C., new commanding officer of the 3rd N. B. Heavy Brigade. Major G. A. Gamblin, O. C., of the 6th, headed the inspection parade last evening. Following the inspection at the Armory, the 6th Siege Battery, under Captain MacLeod, was inspected at the West Side drill hall. The turnout at both parades was excellent and the new commandant was favorably impressed with the manner in which the men carried through the drill.

BRITISH IN MOSUL OIL FIELD.

Former Sultan's Heirs Sell Concessions There for \$5,000,000.

Constantinople, June 22.—The heirs of the late Sultan Abdul Hamid, with the consent of the Sublime Porte, have sold extensive property in the Mosul oil fields to a British syndicate for \$5,000,000, according to the Anatolian press.

The Angora newspaper declares the transaction illegal and urge the Nationalist government not to recognize it. The reported deal is unconfirmed here, but there has been great activity among the representatives of the oil interest for the last two weeks, and a prominent Standard Oil man left this city for Angora on Saturday. Special significance is attached to this trip, as the Kemalists have not granted permission to any Americans to travel into the interior for the last month.

GIVE TRAINING IN SKILLED WORK

Schools for Plasterers, Plumbers, Bricklayers, Carpenters, etc., in San Francisco.

An experiment is being tried in San Francisco by the Industrial Association that is being watched with much interest and with mingled feelings, according to individual economic opinions. Schools have been established there for plasterers and plumbers, and it is intended to start others for bricklayers, steam-fitters, carpenters, electricians, etc. until all the general trades are covered. The enterprise is really intended to break the power of union labor, although the ostensible purpose is declared to be the training of a sufficient number of men to meet the shortage of skilled labor.

Only twenty-one of seventy-five who presented themselves for the plastering course were accepted. Definite requirements as to weight, height and general health were made, as well as the government test as to intelligence. Married men and ex-convicts were given preference. The men are taught by skilled workers and are paid \$2.50 a day. The term consists of twelve weeks of forty-four hours each, and includes plain and ornamental plastering. They are then put on regular jobs, where they are paid somewhat less than regular pay. They are expected to attain journeymen's rank at the end of twelve months.

The Industrial Association claims that this action is to escape the impossible conditions imposed upon them by union labor in San Francisco. The experiment is being watched closely by industrial men in New York, Chicago and St. Louis, where somewhat similar conditions are said to prevail, and much construction work is held up by differences between employers and union leaders. This is believed to be the first time an organized effort has been made to overcome one of the strongest features in unionism, control

YUKON LIQUOR TRAIN.
Passes From U. S. Territory in Time to Escape Embargo.

Dawson City, June 23.—A trainload of assorted drinkable steamed into Canadian territory on the White Pass and Yukon Railway a few hours before the embargo on intoxicants passing through United States territory became effective.

Fourteen freight cars packed to the roof brought provision against the probable dry spell which must intervene until, if ever, the United States government can be prevailed upon to permit the Yukon to bring its liquor through American territory, the only present route available.

The embargo brought about by the decision of the United States Supreme Court that liquor could not be carried through American territory became effective at midnight on June 18.

KEEPS SON IMPRISONED FIVE MONTHS IN CELLAR
Syracuse, N. Y., June 23.—Herbert P. Vernier, assistant production manager of the Brown Lippe Gear Company of this city was sentenced to serve five months in the Onondaga County Penitentiary after he had pleaded guilty, with his wife, to a charge that they kept their five-year-old son, Kenneth, imprisoned for five months in an old dry goods box in the coal cellar of their home, No. 102 Marlborough road, Eastwood, a suburb.

The boy, half starved, indescribably filthy with cellar dirt and wearing only a thin cotton shirt, was rescued from his prison by the Children's Society two months ago.

At the same time County Judge William L. Barnum sentenced Mrs. Vernier to serve ten days at hard labor in the same institution.

A VOCATIONAL SCHOOL.
There are three courses offered at the Carleton County Vocational School in Woodstock. One of two years duration is known as the course in agriculture and farm mechanics the school year of which extends from November 1st until April 15th. This course caters only to boys from the farm whose intention it is to remain on the farm as a life work. The other two courses are the commercial and the home making courses which cater to young ladies and each of which is of one year's duration, beginning September 18th and terminating June 30th.

With the exception of the cost of board and lodging and an expenditure for a very few text-books, note-books and pencils, etc., not amounting to more than fifteen dollars, the courses are free to residents of the county.

JERSEY JUDGE PUTS FINES ON CHARGE ACCOUNT BASIS
Gloucester, N. J., June 23.—Mayor Anderson, acting in the capacity of magistrate, sees no reason why a public court should not extend credit like a department store and other institutions. So when two celebrators told him they had spent all their ready cash for liquor, he agreed to their request to extend credit on their lines of \$3.75 each until "next pay day."
