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C. OF ENGLAND DIOCESES. Changes in connection with the administration of the Church of England in Eastern Canada are being discussed and it is thought that all the dioceses of Ontario will form a provincial synod to be presided over by Archbishop Hamilton of Ottawa. Bishop Farthing will be in charge of the diocese of Montreal, Bishop Dunn at Quebec and Bishop Richardson at Fredericton. Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island will be under the charge of Bishop Worrell. This will make practically five dioceses with only four bishops. It is also hoped that Newfoundland will enter the new ecclesiastical province.

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KEIR HARDIE'S FAREWELL TO THE LABOR CONGRESS

The Matter of Contributions To International Unions — Next Year's Convention

Joseph, Ont., Sept. 11.—Keir Hardie, M. P., said farewell to the Trades and Labor Congress last night in these words:—"If you make as great progress in the next three years as you have in the past three days Canada will take her place in the front rank of the labor world. By this, Canada will not only link itself up with the British empire, but with the workmen of the entire world. Workers of the world unite. You have nothing to lose except your chains and everything to gain."
