NEWS IN BRIEF.

John Bell, the old man who was struck by a street car at the corner of Spadina avenue and Cecil Street, Toronto, on Thursday night, died from his injuries at the Emergency Hospital on Saturday afternoon.

William Russell, representing the Independent Harvesters' Company, of Chicago, has written Mayor Ferguson of Stratford in regard to locating a branch there. The council will deal with the matter.

The London Board of Education Friday night received a proposal from Chairman Yeates that the city adopt a pension system for teachers. The retiring age of male teachers to be 65 and for females 55 years.

The congregation of Port Dalhousie Presbyterian church has extended a call to Rev. Dr. John Ross of Brantford, Rev. Donald Tait, who has been supplying at Port Dalhousie goes to Guelph, having accepted a call there.

Mr. Henry Boughner of Tillsonburg met with a bad accident Tuesday evening. He was leaning against one of the outer doors of the town hall when the bolt gave way and he fell down the steps to the sidewalk. He received a severe shaking up and hurt his left arm. He struck on his face and it is badly cut.

Tillsonburg Observer: The Methodist church was fined \$1 and costs of the court, amounting to about \$10, on Thursday of last week, for infringing the fire limits bylaw. The amount named does not include solicitor's fees. L. B. C. Livingstone appeared for the town and W. A. Dwyer for the church.

About four hundred Woodstock shareholders of the York County Loan met in the city hall Thursday night. W. S. West was unanimously appointed by the meeting to take the books to Toronto and receive receipts for the same, when the time comes for sending down the books.

Forty-four heirs are claimants to the 150 acre farm left by Jos. Myles, who died in Burford township on January 4, 1870. These heirs are situated in various parts of Canada, and the United States. Chief Justice Meredith in Osgoode Hall, Toronto, has enlarged the case until January, and in the meantime Judge Hardy will administer the estate.

Brantford Examiner: Residents in the vicinity of Burford and Fairfield Plains say they have been expecting something in the nature of the Green shooting case for some time. They say that brawls and fights are a common thing in the big Baker bush, where the Indians are employed all winter chopping wood. Whiskey is said to be the great trouble.

Mail and Empire: Several residents of the West End, have been victimized lately by a woman who, when the housekeepers are away, goes to the house and leaves a parcel with the maid, stating that the lady of the house ordered it, and collecting sums ranging from 25 cents to one dollar. The woman is short, wears a grey skirt and light coat. She generally leaves a parcel containing summer savory.

William H. Zinn, 68 Gerard St. west, Toronto, was arrested Thursday by Detective Kennedy on a warrant charging him with stealing three dollars from the J. F. Brown Co. Zinn is the manager of the Brown Co.'s Queen street store, and is alleged to have been stealing for some time. He destroyed the cash book, and it will be about three weeks before the exact extent of the charges to be laid against him. Zinn is 29 years old, and is married.

The November report of the Provincial Board of Health states that the returns are more complete than for the same month last year, there being 20 more divisions reporting, giving the total deaths from all causes as 2,011, or 186 more than were reported in November, 1904. The death rate per 1,000 is 12.3, as compared with 12.0 a year ago. The most regrettable feature of the infectious disease returns is the increase of smallpox, which gave 180 more cases.

HOCKEY.

Stratford Beacon: The hockey season in Stratford is scheduled to open on Tuesday next, when the intermediates play their initial game with Ingersoll. It remains with the weather man to decide whether the ice will be in fit shape or not. The present cold snap is welcomed by the local hockey fans, and enthusiasm, which on account of the dragging season, has been absent in the players, is showing itself at last. It is not yet definitely decided what players will constitute the intermediate team, as there are several aspirants, and as yet these have not had an opportunity of showing their prowess. The team will be somewhat handicapped in having had only one work-out on the ice, but owing to their diligent and steady practice in the Y. M. C. OTTAWA DEFEATED.

Winnipeg, Dec. 31.—In a game that was brilliantly spectacular, and marked by one of the most sensational finishes that has ever been seen on local ice, the Kenora Thistles, champions of the Manitoba Hockey League, humbled the mighty Ottawa at the Arena Saturday night before a crowd of nearly 4,000 people, that taxed the capacity of the rink to its utmost. The score was 8 to 6. The Thistles won out in the last eight minutes of play, when everybody thought it was all over. Ottawa had the score six to four eight minutes before time was up, and they had apparently played the Thistles to a standstill. Phillips retrieved the day for his team, and he won it on his nerve. Seemingly exhausted he recuperated in wonderful manner, and to his efforts the three goals that put the Thistles in the lead were responsible. Two of the goals he scored himself, and the other was secured by Matt Brown on a pass from Phillips. With about a minute to play Hooper scored another and clinched the game.

The Popular Scotch Prima-Donna
In the picturesque little seaport town of Oban, Scotland, with its beautiful scenery and its inspiring historic associations, Miss Jessie MacLachlan, the famous Scotch prima-donna, was born. She was very young when she first revealed her unusual musical endowment, for Nature gave her a voice of rare sweetness and power. When she was but twelve she joined the choir in her native town, and with a thrill of surprise the choir-master heard her sing. So pleased was he with the possibilities of her voice that he urged her to guard her golden treasure with care, to avoid indiscriminate singing until she should be trained and perfected under the best teachers. He recommended her to devote her life to song, and told her, with a prophetic glimpse, that she would be numbered among the world's greatest singers.

Under the enthusiastic teaching of Edwin Holland of the Guildhall School of Music, and other masters, her training was continued until she was ready for her first public appearance. Her intense love of Scotland, a patriotism that seems the keynote of her whole nature, led her to realize the possibilities of the old Gaelic ballads, the heart songs of her people, and when Glasgow recognized her genius, her fame quickly spread through Great Britain, and the doors of conservative London opened in welcome.

At Balmoral she was commanded to sing before Queen Victoria, who expressed her royal appreciation by presenting to her a superb bracelet. For nearly two and a half centuries no Highlander had been summoned to the throne—the latest one being a MacCrimmon piper who, in 1651, had the honor of performing before the King and kissing his hand.

Miss MacLachlan's voice is a rich full soprano, vibrant with feeling and dramatic power. It is not the mere singing, the mere succession of pure liquid notes, that rouses her audiences, it is the magnetic force of her personality, her absorption of the spirit of the song that carries the words from the heart of some Scotch poet of centuries ago to find their echoing note in the hearts of his twentieth-century fellow-countrymen.

On her fourth tour of the world she is awakening enthusiasm wherever her voice is heard, and is now singing in Australia. In Boston, before an audience of 5,000, when she gave the stirring martial air, "Wi' a Hundred Pipers," men jumped on chairs and waved their hands and shouted. In Toronto, encore after encore inspired new songs, until the singer grew wearied—a welcome typical of her entire tour.

C. P. R. TO ESTABLISH A LINE FROM PORT BURELL TO ASHLANDULA.

Montreal, Dec. 28.—Mr. D. Nicoll, General Manager of the Canadian Pacific, announced today that the C. P. R. in conjunction with the Pennsylvania, and J. W. Ellsworth, colliery proprietor, Cleveland, has decided to establish a ferry service between Pt. Burwell, Ont., and Ashlandula, Ohio. The new service he said, was the logical development of the acquisition by the Canadian Pacific of the Tillsonburg, Lake Erie and Pacific Railway.

COMPLAINT AGAINST BARBER

MAN CHARGED \$1.50 FOR SHAM-POO, SHAVE AND HAIR-CUT OBJECTS.

Toronto, Dec. 29.—A complaint against a city barber has been lodged with the police department. Mr. Howard Croft of Wilberforce, Ont., returned to Buffalo after a holiday, stopped in Toronto yesterday and went into a barber shop on Yonge street, where he got a hair cut, shave and shampoo. On getting out of the chair the barber demanded \$1.00. On protest the barber compromised at \$1.50, which Mr. Croft says he paid to avoid a scene, but demanded a receipt. He asked that it be itemized, but this was refused. The acknowledgment was written on a piece of wrapping paper and read, "received \$1.50 for work in barber shop," and signed by the barber.

A POLICY EXPOUNDED

Chamberlain Explains Fiscal Ideas in Election Manifesto.

A BLAST FROM DEVONSHIRE

Attacks the New Government, Which He Dubs a "Home Rule, Little Englander Government" — Discusses Constructive and Retaliative Aspects of Colonial Preference — Proposes Moderate Tariff.

London, Jan. 2.—Joseph Chamberlain issued his election manifesto yesterday.

After vigorously attacking the new Government, which he describes as being essentially a "Home Rule, Little Englander Government" depending for its existence on Irish votes, he devotes himself entirely to an exposition of his fiscal policy, especially to the subject of Colonial preference, which he speaks of as the first item in the constructive program of the Unionist party; the second item, closely connected with the first being the policy of retaliation.

He declares that the Colonies will not wait indefinitely, but will be forced to enter into arrangements with strangers. He points out that the scheme of Colonial preference will include a provision for the small tax on foreign wheat but says that as both home-grown and Colonial wheat will be free, and the supply from the Colonies unlimited, the price of bread will not be increased in the slightest degree.

Unionist Party Agreed. Mr. Chamberlain declares that he believes the Unionist party to be absolutely agreed regarding these aims though he admits there may be some differences of opinion when the time comes to discuss the methods by which these aims are to be accomplished. He says, however, that these differences of opinion probably are exaggerated, and that they are matters more of verbal distinction than of practical importance. Continuing, Mr. Chamberlain says:

"I believe our objects can be attained by a moderate general tariff, scientifically adapted to the existing conditions of our trade, and so arranged as to secure the largest amount of employment at fair wages for our people. It would necessarily provide for the free admission of raw materials and of articles which we do not make ourselves, while it would place a toll on the manufacturers of those countries which do not treat us fairly."

Summed Up. "Our policy is constructive and practical, while the policy of our opponents is destructive and theoretical."

DUKE OF DEVONSHIRE.

Issues Manifesto Against Retrograde Fiscal Policy—Says Home Rule is a Side Issue.

London, Jan. 2.—The Duke of Devonshire, Liberal-Unionist, has issued an important election manifesto in which he virtually advises the Free Trade Unionists to support the Liberal candidates rather than the Protectionist Unionists. By treating the home rule question as a mere side issue he deals the strongest blow yet against Mr. Balfour's election tactics.

The duke asserts that there is no indication that the opinion of the country has changed since the rejection of the last home rule bill and that it is in the highest degree improbable that the Government of Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman will incur the risk of introducing another such measure in the next Parliament. Therefore, he says, the question of free trade versus protection must be the paramount factor in the coming elections, and he declares there must be no deviation from attachment to free trade.

The duke confesses that he knows no more now than when he left the late Government of what is implied by the Balfourian fiscal scheme, which its authors declare to be acceptable to free traders and protectionists alike. On the other hand, he says there is no ambiguity about the Chamberlain propaganda, which is avowedly protectionist. The manifesto contends that the Unionist party organization has largely been captured by the Protectionist wing, and that should the party become predominantly Protectionist there will be either real danger to free trade or the prospects of the exclusion of the Unionist party for an indefinite period from either power or influence.

In conclusion, the duke declares that it is the duty of Unionist Free Traders to take such action as will prove that the Unionist party, as a whole, whether in power or in Opposition, is still uncommitted to a retrograde fiscal policy by whomsoever it may be proposed.

FIVE MAY BE DEAD.

Bad Head-On Collision Occurs at Kinross, Man.

Winnipeg, Jan. 2.—A head-on collision occurred early yesterday afternoon between two freights at Kinross, 45 miles east of Chapeau, when the engineer and brakeman were killed. It is reported that three more are killed and many injured. The wrecking train from Fort William left for the scene at 3 o'clock.
