FIGHT IN WEST ELGIN.

Liberals Trying a Little Game in Two
Townships.

Mr. Robert Birmingham has return-
ed from a trip in Western Ontario,
in the course of which he visited St.
Thomas, which is in the constituency
of West Elgin. He states that the
legislative bye-election is expected
there between now and November 15.
The Liberals are pushing forward the
work of revision in all but two town-
ships, which usually return a strong-
ly Conservative majority. It is believ-
ed that the writ for a bye-election
will be sprung soon enough to ahead
and thus have a poll which would
shut out those not included on the
Grit lists. This is a new trick in
political warfare.

The fight, when it does take place,
will probably be from within. The
Conservatives will bring no outsiders
into the constituency, and will rely on
the knowledge of the electorate that
they were cheated out of their votes
last time, as evidenced by the con-
fession of Mr. Macnisch.

BRUCE HOLMES DEAD.

After an illness extending a little
over a year, Bruce Holmes, of this
city, passed away at his residence on
Centre street last evening. Mr.
Holmes was formerly engineer at the
waterworks, but fell a victim to the
dread disease, consumption, and was
forced to give up his position. Mr.
Holmes lived most of his life in this
vicinity and was well known. Some
15 years ago he married Louise, daugh-
ter of Robert McFarvin. A family of
three girls and two boys are left to
mourn their father's loss. The fun-
eral will take place Thursday at 2
o'clock.

The deceased was a son of W. W.
Holmes, a well known citizen, resident
on Park avenue west. Theodore
Holmes, of Windsor; and Mrs. W.
Woodsworth, of Toronto, were a bro-
ther and sister of Bruce's respectively,
while Rev. Macaulay Holmes, of Leam-
ington, and Mrs. Bowes, of Toronto,
were half-brother and half-sister.
Mr. Bruce Holmes was an esteemed
member of the A. O. U. W. and the
Workmen of the city will attend his
funeral in a body.

Lady Aberdeen offering her the free-
dom of the city in anticipation of her
visit.

James Fraser, a native of Wood-
stock, has been unanimously elected to
the presidency of the Royal College of
Veterinarians, London, Eng.
This is the highest honor that can be
conferred upon any member of the pro-
fession, and Mr. Fraser is the first col-
onist to occupy the position.

Judge Florin, of Rossland, B. C., has
refused the extradition of Charles A.
Hinckley, recently known as C. S. Mor-
ris, and formerly of Toronto, the con-
fession of the crime of robbing the
West Side Bank, of New York, of \$95,-
000, on the ground that when the of-

ted the late James Lamont and the
