The negotiations between the Church of Scotiand and the United Free Church have reached a new and important stage. The one hundred representatives chosen by the General Assembly of the Church of Scotiand have, it is understood, considered at a recent meeting in Edinburgh a draft of the general lines of the declaration such as Parliament might be asked to sanction, defining the limits within which the demand of the Church to complete freedom from State interference in its purely spiritual affairs might be formulated so as to satisfy the religious scruples of members of the United Free Church.

Some time must necessarily be consumed in the perfecting of a document of such momentous importance, and in securing general consent to its terms before Parliament is asked to legislate. It may be a year or two before the question reaches Parliament, as the hands of the present Government are fully cocupied for some time to come, and the controversy aroused by the Welsh disestablishment bill might well prove an insuperable obstacle to Parliamentary action at the present juncture of political affairs in the United Kingdom.
