WILD TURKEY RASSES. King of Ontario's Game Birds N Exterminated.

Sixty or seventy years ago, in the Niagara Peninsula and all up along Lake Erie's shore, wild turkeys were very plentiful, says C.M.C. in Toronto Star Weekly. What happened to them? Shot out—trapped out—decimated; taking his size and rare flayor into consideration—once the King of Canadian game birds! A Government report of 1892 remarks: 'It is now becoming very rare, and is found probably only in the counties of Essex and Kent, and even there it is only a matter of a short time when it must become extinct." From all we ever hear of its this is precisely what has happened. As far as this province is concerned the wild turkey has apparently flown to join the Great Auk and our storied Passenger Pigeon "sun-screens."

those magnificent creatures of three and a haif feet long and five feet in wing spread, often weighing over 20 pounds—and almost the exact counter-part in appearance of our highes valued barnyard fowls.

When the young wild turkeys were hatched, beside some close-hidden log or in the seclusion of the deepest thickets, ten — sometimes fifteen—went to the brood. The mother bird made them the objects of her most constant solicitude and care, the little conest following close or a chickets.

cones following close as she crept stealthily about among the densest available, growth, where the grasses, plants, and truits that they fed on most abounded. Seeds and buds, too, they loved, and could never resist such delicacles as beetles, tadpoles, and small lizards. The only audible sign of the advance would be the mother's low, tender piping. Any danger ahead, and — at her instant change of tone — every toddler of them disappeared, only to emerge at the cautious parent's soft cluck.

They were very rarely caught sight of on the ground, but a dog could always flush them Into the lower branches of the mearest trees, which was where the guns could flame their deadly work. Oftener, however, "trapping" was resorted to, for the wild turkey was swift in addition to its warlness, and like as not ended its flight in the tallest tree instead.

The ways and means of trapping wild turkeys were as varied as the strategy of the farmer's boy was superficial or profound. Generally a measure of corn, bagged from dads crib, and a hatchet were the only accessories asked for or purloined without the asking. An hour or two in the bush was sufficient for the gathering together of enough poles and brush to erect a small "stockade fort," built square, and contracting towards the top, where a rough thatching completed the death chamber. Again the hand-are was called into requisition; this time to facilitate the construction of a "asily port" or ditch-like entrance, of size ample to admit of the entrance of a single turkey. The trap was complete. To bait it was simplicity itself, for the turkey-trapper only laid a few tempting trains from his corn bag, starting at some distance away, and leading through the bush from opposite directions to the entrance of the pen, which also was strewn with the yellow grains that were so literally "a delusion and a snare." Once in the dark interior whither his love for maize had led him, all reason seemed to leave the big, wary bird at once, and he fiew round like one possesse, wounding himself ag

That a rich new fishing ground is That a rich new fishing ground is afforded by the waters of Hudson Strait is set forth in a report to the Marine and Fisheries Department by Dominion Fishery Officer Thomas Tanner. Its salmon catch particularly may yet rival that of British Columbia. The area is practically a virgin one and large supplies of valuable fish could be taken. The dimiculties are the sparse population and lack of fishermen and the very shirt season. With Port Burwell as a centre trawling could be done during eight or twelve weeks. There is no limit to the quantity of codfish, a few loads of which are garnered by Newfoundland wessels which come up every year. The weather is perfect for fishing, but not so favorable for drying them on the spot. The catches, however, can be salted and taken home to the curing places, just as is the practice of Lunenburg fleet. As this is deep-sea fishing, no doubt a bounty could be authorized during the first few years when the industry is in the first stages of its development. The sum of \$160,000 per annum is available.
