Resolved: 1st.—That this Municipality issue Debentures to the amount of thirteen thousand five hundred dollars (\$13,500).

2nd.—That said Debentures be numbered consecutively, commencing with the number 1.

3rd.—That said Debentures there be issued twenty fifty dollars each; fifty of one hundred dollars each; twenty-five of two hundred dollars each; five of three hundred dollars each; and two of five hundred dollars each.

4th.—That the form of such Debentures be as follows:

To the Treasurer of the Municipality of Kent, Pay to the order of..... or order, the sum of \$..... after the date hereof, and charge the same to the "Debenture Fund" of the Municipality of Kent.
