The proposal is to have an exhibition which shall be national, imperial and international in character and the project has been commended by Lord Strathcons, Earl Grey, Sir Charles Tupper and others. Plans have been prepared by Mr. Septimus Warwick, a member of the Council of the Royal Institute of British Architects, These plans provide for an exhibition covering two hundred acres and costing five millions.

They show a main thoroughfare called Confederation Avenue, on which would be erected Dominion and projucial buildings. A square to be called Strathcona Square would occupy the centre of the exhibition and on this square would be erected a large congress hall. Other squares would bear the names of King George the Fifth and Jacques Cartier. Vessels Weather Bound at Astoria—Many Thousands in Danger—Railroad Traffic Demoralized.

Seattle, Wash., Jan. 7.—The Pacific coast from San Francisco to British Columbia was drenched and flooded today by storms, which have continued for ten days, and which have extended well inland.

Basements are flooded, sewers blocked and streets torn up at Astoria, Oregon. Twenty vessels afe weather-bound in that harbor, unable to pass the high surf on the bar. This fleet is being augmented by arrivals from Vessels Weather Bound at

More than nine inches of rain has fallen at Aberdeen, Washington, since Saturday, and low-lands over a wide section of western Washington are under water. It has been impossible to estimate the damage in that section. Mud-sildes are holding up trains in several isolated places.

GERMAN CHANCELLOR IS **DEFENDANT IN LAWSUIT**

Potash Syndicate Brings Action for Recovery of Two Million Dollar Fund for Advertising German Fertilizer —Amount Was Raised by Taxing Prduct.

Berlin, Jan. 7—A suit against Im-perial Chancellor Von Bethmann-Hollweg is to be brought by the Ger-Hollweg is to be brought by the German potash syndicate, which demands from him the return of \$2,000,000, forming the so-called 'propaganda fund' for advertising the merits of the German fertilizer at home and abroad. This amount was raised by imposing a tax on all potash mined in Germany under the law of 1910.

A part of the fund for the specified purpose remains on hand, and it is stated in some quarters that the government is allowing it to accumulate with the idea of diverting it to gen.
