

Referring to the attack on Mr. Foster for his absence, Mr. Borden said that Sir Wilfrid Laurier, at all events, should be well contented with the minister of trade and commerce absent. However, he would observe that the bill Foster was on the ocean and should be in his seat about Monday next.

Mr. Borden said with this in view, the bill on highways will, he thought, the senate had twice killed, had become a perfectly fair measure. It had covered the interests of every province in Canada.

It could have been perfectly voting to accept it in the form in which the government had presented it. He himself had given his pledge that the disposition of the provinces should be in accordance with their population, and the estimates had borne this in mind.

When the measure was first introduced the Liberal opposition, in its heartiness and rule-warm support, they had ended by voting square against it. The senate then, on Mr. Laurier's responsibility, had inserted amendments which the government could not accept.

"Until a majority of the senate has taken the vote of rejection, and with the wishes of the majority of the house it is useless for us to re-introduce this bill," said Mr. Borden to government applause.

Mr. Borden had then thrown out the motions passed by the committee, namely, the highways bill, the commission bill, the Intercolonial branch lines bill, and the Canadian Pacific bill, and the control over the railways when it set itself up in opposition.

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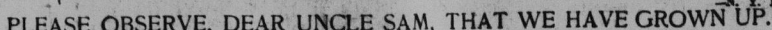
