## FINAL RESULT OF REGATTA—HARVARD EIGHT WON THE CUP

### London, July 6.—The Henley regatta, which ended on Saturday, has further confirmed the fact that England cannot now claim the amateur aquatic supremacy. With the Grand Challenge cup won by Harvard and the Diamond Sculls won by the Italian Siniaglia, the two most important events of the regatta were lost to England.

From 1839 to 1906 no foreign or overseas crew had taken the Grand Challenge cup, but in the latter year the Belgians captured the trophy, repeating their triumph in 1907 and 1909. The Diamond Sculls have been won by outsiders five times since 1892, one of the winners being Scholles, of Toronto. The general result of the regatta that Cambridge won four events, Italy and the United States one each, two principal trophies go to Italy and the United States. Although Winnipeg fell before Harbord, of Toronto, was defeated by the Italian oarsman, the showing made in each case was highly creditable to the Canadians.

### Harvard Crew Won.

Henley-On-Thames, July 4.—Harvard second eight, rowing with splendid judgment, today defeated the Union Boat Club of Boston in the final Harvard Challenge cup and secured the coveted trophy for the United States for the first time in its history, which dates back to 1839.

## GOLFER LYON EIGHTH TIME A CHAMPION

### Ottawa, July 4.—George S. Lyon, Jr.

for the eighth time amateur champion of Canada. He won the title today by defeating Brice Evans, of the Waverly Country Club, Boston. Both players were in good form, in fact, the Lambert captain rose to the top of his game and 75 for the first eighteen was not only wonderful match play but also was the second best amateur performance ever shown on the Royal Ottawa Golf Club. The best performance was produced by Lyon himself when he beat Evans on the 18th hole in 73 beating the previous amateur record by three strokes.

#### Philadelphia, July 4.—The University of Pennsylvania eight-oared crew, the same combination with a few exceptions which finished second to Columbia at Poughkeepsie, beat the Argonaut eight of Toronto by half a length in six minutes fifty-one seconds in the senior eight-oared race, the feature event of the annual regatta, rowed today over the mile and a quarter course on the Schuylkill river. The Detroit Boat Club finished third; New York A. C. fourth; Vesper Boat Club of this city, fifth; and Arletts of Baltimore, last.

### THIS DATE IN RING ANNALS

1900.—Eddie Santry defeated Oscar Gardner in 20 rounds at Kansas City. Old-time fight fans will recall with pleasure the performances of these clever little lads. During a ring career lasting nearly fifteen years Santry fought the best featherweights of two pugilistic generations. He fought a draw with Solly Smith when the latter was featherweight champion, knocked out Australian Billy Murphy in 1898 at St. Louis, whipped Tommy Dixon at Toronto the same year and in 1899 he met George Dixon on the third time and fought the "Chocolate Drop" by whom he had twice been defeated, to a 26-round draw. In his first bout with Gardner, the "Omaha Kid," at Louisville in 1900, Oscar was the victor, but Eddie turned the tables at Kay See. In 1901 Santry found his master in Young Corbett at Denver, and Gardner also took the count at the hands of the Colorado boy.

### Joe Tinker, father of the Federal League, 34 tomorrow.

You savvy Muscoda, Kansas? No can do? Ignorant ignoramus! Muscoda may not be a towering Topeka nor a wonderful Wichita, but it does serve black-face type on the map as the birthplace of Joseph Bert Tinker, father of the Federal League. With the rising of the morning sun thirty-four years will have elapsed since that red-letter day in Muscoda's history, July 7, 1880, when J. Bert arrived at the home of his parents. The greatest shortstop of them all debuted into professional baseball at age sixteen in the Sunflower State, fifteen years ago. He finished the season with the Denver Grizzlies, covered third-base for Portland in the Northwestern League, in 1901, and joined the Cubs in 1902. All fans recall them happy days of thrilling stunts and double plays—Tinker to Evers to Chance. Of that great aggregation of world-beaters, Frank Schulte alone remains. Catcher Kling plays ball on a green-toppe table in Kansas City, Pitchers Tinker and Evers to Chance. Brown, the Tiger third-baseman, will be thirty tomorrow.
