To the Reverend Scovell Neales, M. A., Dean-Designate of Christ Church Cathedral, Fredericton.

Rev. and Dear Sir: The Warden and Vestry of Trinity Church on behalf of the parishioners, meet you this evening to express their deep and sincere regret at your departure from this parish.

When you came to Sussex eighteen years ago you found the parish torn and the parishioners divided against themselves. You undertook a difficult task and by your earnest effort and true Christian spirit you have succeeded in banishing strife and uniting us in one harmonious family.

GENEROUS GIFT TO ACADIA UNIVERSITY

B. J. Raynor's gift of \$16,000 to help rebuild students' residence.

Through the generosity of B. J. Raynor, Esq., of Alberton, P. E. I., the rebuilding of the students' residence belonging to the preparatory department of Acadia University, known as Acadia Collegiate Academy, Wolfville, is assured. Mr. Raynor has very generously offered to the Governors of Acadia \$16,000 to be used for that purpose. The contract for the new stone building will be let at once, in order that it may be ready for occupancy at the beginning of the new term, September 1st next.

It is evident that Acadia University is very fortunate in having friends with which to meet every emergency. It will be remembered that on February 3rd, last, the Academy Residence, which had boarding accommodations for 80 students, was destroyed by fire. Plans were immediately made for a new stone building, thoroughly modern in every respect, with accommodations for as many students as the old residence. The work has been delayed, however, for lack of funds. This generous gift of Mr. Raynor, together with \$3,000 promised by D. C. Clark, Esq., of St. John (previously announced), and the insurance funds already in hand, will be sufficient to warrant the Governors in proceeding with the construction of the new residence to be known as the B. J. Raynor Hall.

The new building will be 133 feet long, with three stories and basement, divided into sections by fire-proof brick walls. The plans, prepared by Architect A. R. Cobb, S. M., of Halifax, provide club-room and students' rooms, all arranged according to the most modern system for a Residential School for Boys and Young Men. It will be one of the most up-to-date institutions of the kind in Eastern Canada.

By his generous gift Mr. Raynor has shown his interest in the public welfare, and has carried into effect his desire to assist worthy young men in their preparation for their life-work. According to the terms of the gift, one room shall be occupied, rent free, by two worthy and needy students, to be named by Mr. Raynor, or by the Principal of the school.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST LAND REGULATIONS.

The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Application must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions. Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 40 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house in required residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent also 40 acres; extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$5.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 40 acres and erect a house worth \$500.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST MINING REGULATIONS.

COAL—Coal mining rights may be leased for twenty-one years, renewable at an annual rental of \$1 an acre. Not more than 2,560 acres can be leased to one applicant. Royalty, five cents per ton. In unmined territory the tract must be staked out by the applicant in person, and personal application to the Agent or Sub-Agent of Dominion Lands for the district, must in all cases be made, and the rental for the first year must be paid to the Agent within thirty days after filing application.

QUARTZ—A person eighteen years of age and over, having made a discovery of quartz, may locate a claim of not more than 100 acres. The fee for the claim is \$10. At least \$100 must be expended on the claim each year, or paid to the Agent of Dominion Lands when \$500.00 has been expended or paid and other requirements complied with, the claim may be purchased at \$1 an acre.

PLACING MINING CLAIMS are 500 feet long and from 1,000 to 2,000 feet wide. Entry fee, \$5. Not less than \$100 must be expended in development work each year. DREDGING—Two leases of five miles each of a river may be issued to one applicant for a term of 20 years. Rental, \$10 a mile per annum. Royalty, 2 1/2 per cent after the output exceeds \$10,000.
