During the year the B. Litt. degree was awarded to L. B. Sherman, New Brunswick, 1910 (Christ Church), Theology, The B. C. L. degree was awarded to J. B. McNair, New Brunswick, 1911. University, first class. In 1913 Mr. McLeod obtained a first class in jurisprudence. The B. C. L. degree was also awarded by J. M. P. Coady, Nova Scotia.
