

### SEAMEN'S INSTITUTE HAD A YEAR OF SPLENDID ACTIVITY

Reports Read at Annual Meeting Held Last Evening Showed That 38,212 Seamen Have Taken Advantage of Privileges of the Institution—H. C. Schofield Re-elected President—Societies Have Assisted.

A very large increase in the number of men attending the Seamen's Institute and a year of splendid activity for their comfort and entertainment was reported at the annual meeting of the Seamen's Institute held last evening. H. C. Schofield presided and in his address spoke of plans for the erection of a balcony in the main hall, and enlargement of the sleeping quarters. The services of Walter Brindle as manager have more than fulfilled all expectations. The death of Charles A. McDonald was regretted by the board. He expressed gratitude for the assistance given by the League of Y. W. P. A. and the Ladies Guild. H. J. Evans, treasurer, stated that receipts were \$51,473.77, expenditures \$46,007.37, balance on hand \$4,466.40. The report of the Ladies Guild, signed by M. Watt, told of co-operation and splendid support, especially in hospital work among sailors. Knitting is being done and furnishings have been supplied. A vote of deep appreciation for the endorsement fund secured from the Dominion Council of the Navy League and for the efforts made to secure this by officers of the N. B. Division was moved by H. J. Evans, seconded by George A. Henderson and passed. Officers were elected as follows: H. C. Schofield—President, Capt. Mulcahey—Vice-President, J. N. Rogers—Secretary.

Manager's Annual Report. To the Board of Management of the Seamen's Institute: Gentlemen,—After perusing a collection of past reports of this Association, I think you are entitled to say that the season 1919 and 1920 heads the list in the way of something attempted, something done.

Last season is said to have been an exceptionally large one, in the way of shipping coming to this port, but this season goes one better, showing an increase over last year of 12 ships. Our attendance for season 1919-20 with a total of thirty-eight thousand, shows an increase of eleven thousand over last year, which proves that the popularity of the films from week to week is diminishing among the men in whose interest it was built. This total is entirely apart from the attendance of the public at our open concerts. The social side of our work has been well cared for; not only have the rooms for writing, reading and recreation, been open every day from 9 in the morning to 10 at night, but the "resting-rooms" have been well maintained. One of the great pleasures of the various film exchanges in loading to us free of charge, the various pictures which they control, we have been able to get on to the great appreciation of the men, sixty picture shows and we are very much indebted to the managers of the exchanges, who have supplied the films from week to week, with a willingness that made it appear as if the pleasure was all their own. In addition to this, the Y. W. P. A. have helped out the picture on twenty Saturdays, by providing vocal and other hours to make the evening pass more pleasantly for the boys, and we are truly grateful to the many artists, who have so willingly given of their time and talent in this connection. The canteen, run so ably by the young ladies, has again proved a great attraction, as is vouchsafed for by the crowds that line up at the counter, and the mountains of cakes and other eatables that have disappeared over the night after night. We have found it necessary to run the canteen through the day this year, and this has been run by your staff, and we have found this arrangement has yielded a real windfall during the severe winter weather. We have closed up at 5 o'clock, when the girls with whom we made arrangements as to gas, etc., took it over. The bed this season have proved a good source of income and the need for a larger dormitory has been fully demonstrated. We have been called upon to shelter 800 men in the ordinary way, in addition to the many who have come to us as the result of shipwreck, etc. This season has been a very hard

one on shipping, and as a result we have had to pass over to us for shelter through the season, no less than 63 shipwrecked men who have been cared for, some two, three and four days, as the case demanded, until they could be forwarded home. We have to thank Major Fugh, of the Ordnance Corps, who very kindly loaned us 30 blankets on a night when our beds were filled, and 18 shipwrecked men came in as one time, and the number has never been less than six men in night on several occasions. There were two tubercular cases at the beginning of the season. One of the Marconi operators, who had died and was interred in the Roman Catholic burying ground, the ladies attending the funeral. The Navy League sent a beautiful floral anchor and a letter of thanks was received from the parents of the dead boy, appreciative of all that had been done for him. The other case—that of George Leach—was a very pronounced one, he being in hospital over nine months, and he was eventually sent home in the care of Mr. and Mrs. O'Rourke, who had come over from England to watch the end of his own boy. The Navy League contributed \$25 and the St. Andrew's Society \$20, and several ladies gave smaller sums toward the cost of this boy's passage home. Two fatalities occurred on the boats this season—one man being killed outright and the other died the same day. In the first case, McEneaney, the manager attended the funeral and took part in the service. The second fatality—Alex. McLean—the funeral took place from the Institute, where a most impressive service was conducted by Rev. G. Farquharson, and the interment was in the Bethel house on the coast. The manager attended the funeral and took part in the service. The weekly allowance has been relatively expended by the committee in such things as the men were allowed to have—cigarettes, oranges, chocolates, etc.—and as the men have left the hospital on their recovery, and spent a few days at the Institute while waiting for transportation home, they have been in their pride of the efforts that have been put forth for their comfort and welfare by the committee.

Through the kindness of Captain Kenny, master of the Aberdeen, 90 parcels of magazines were sent to the Bethel house on the coast. The magazines were donated by Mr. Munro, and parcelled by Mother Tolison. I cannot bring this report to a close without thanking again all those who have helped make this season such a success. The Y. W. P. A., who have been so faithful in their attentions to the canteen, and in the Saturday concerts and also for transporting home, they have been in their pride of the efforts that have been put forth for their comfort and welfare by the committee. 
