Fredericton, March 12—(Special)—C. N. Skinner, of St. John, gives notice in this week's Royal Gazette that application will be made at the approaching session of the legislature for an act to incorporate a company with power to construct lines of railway as follows: From Chipman to a point on the Canada Eastern Railway, thence to the point of junction with the Restigouche & Western Railway, thence to Edmundston; also a line from Norton, Kings county, through Salt Springs Valley by way of Barnesville and Loch Lomond to St. John; also to enter into a contract with the Canada Railway and Cobal Company, the Shediac & Coast Railway Co., the St. John Valley & River Du Loup Railway Co., for the construction of their several lines of railway, and if arrangements can be made to operate all said lines as one system with power to sell The Daily

The company will also seek authority to amalgamate with or enter into traffic arrangements with the Quebec & New Brunswick Railway Co., the New Bruns-Brunswick Railway Co., the New Brunswick Railway & Coal Co., the Hampton & St. Martins Railway, Monoton & Buctouche Railway, and other railways within the province, and also have power to extend their line to a railway which a company is authorized to build from Chipman to Monoton to a point of connection with the line of the Shediac & Coast Bailway at Shediac and to extend the Railway at Shediac and to extend the railway to the Nova Scotia boundary

line.
