the tremendous total of 51,-000,000 pounds was reached. On the other hand, in 1900 Ontario produced 131,967,612 pounds of cheese, since which time a gradual decrease in output is shown, until in 1922 but 90,500,000 pounds was produced. This latter condition is the more abnormal from the fact that the output of 1900 was valued at \$13,440,987, while the much lower quantity of 1922. much lower quantity of was valued at \$14,932,000.
