ANSWERS MR. BAKER IN DISCUSSION ON MOTHERS' PENSIONS

T. D. McCullough Denies Counties Dumping Surplus Widows On City.

In reply to the statements made this week by City Clerk S. Bole, that "many rural communities are dumping surplus widows on the city of London in order that municipalities may escape payment of their portion of the mothers' pensions," Mr. T. D. McCullough, one of the members of the local pensions board, says the following:

No Such Effort Made. "Referring to the statement of City Clerk Bole, let me say that no effort has been made by any rural municipality to dump their widows and children on our city. Mr. Bole should know that according to the regulations any married woman who comes to the city for relief must first be referred to the local board of supervisors, and if they are found to be deserving, they are sent to the city of London for relief."

Mr. Wilson's Will Statement. "Then, with regard to the will statement of Dr. J. C. Wilson, which states that 20 per cent of the funds is over and 10 per cent reaches the head of the family, let me say that the cost of investigation in proportion to the benefit given in this city is less than 2 per cent, and that 2 per cent does not come out of the municipality, but from the provincial fund. It is the doctor's duty to make a diagnosis as accurate as possible, or the gravest error would be kept."

INCREASED INSURANCE FOR SCHOOLS OF CITY

That the insurance of the city's school buildings and their contents shall be placed solely with British Canadian fire insurance companies, and that it shall be placed only through legally qualified agents, was the substance of a motion presented by Trustee Smith yesterday afternoon to the board of education to deal with the matter of insuring the schools. The motion was approved.

The committee decided to recommend that the insurance be placed at \$14,000, an increase of about \$4,000 over the figure set at the last tri-annual review of the insurance.

TRUSTEE DOWE ANSWERS ATTACK ON COMMITTEE

Mrs. Hunt Corrects Statements She Was Credited With Making.

Just before the special meeting of the board of education, held yesterday for the purpose of receiving the report of the special committee named to receive applications for the position of secretary to the board, removed by the death of the late secretary, R. M. McElhennan, concluded its sitting. Trustee Thomas Rowe, chairman of the industrial and arts advisory committee, asked permission to speak to a question of privilege.

Permission was granted, and Mr. Rowe spoke as follows: "Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,—As chairman of the advisory industrial committee, I rise to a question of privilege."

"It is not my custom to treat too seriously newspaper reports of interviews with trustees, but I am compelled to do so in this case, as the statements made by Mrs. Hunt are absolutely untrue, and I am sure that no one in the school is studying that report."

The interview makes two charges against the advisory industrial committee, both of which are utterly untrue. "First, that the estimates contained an expenditure for wiring, when in fact the school is studying that report."

"Second, that the estimates of the advisory industrial committee were not approved by that body until the afternoon of the final day. The first is a trifling matter, but nevertheless untrue. I have carefully read the estimates of the advisory industrial committee, as I shall explain in a moment, and am thoroughly conversant with them. Mrs. Hunt herself was supplied with a copy of these estimates at the last meeting of the board, and I challenge her to point out an item in the estimates which she has not seen."

"Mrs. Hunt was present at the meeting of the board, and she was present at the meeting of the advisory industrial committee, when Principal Beal outlined the policy of the school in regard to practical work given to students. "The estimates of this committee were prepared during the month of February (two or three weeks before being presented to the board) by the principal of the school. More than two weeks before they were presented to the board, I spent the best part of an afternoon with Principal Beal in going over the preliminary draft of the estimates. Every item was carefully considered."

"When the advisory industrial committee was called, not as Mrs. Hunt asserts, on the final day, but on February 28, one full week before the estimates were presented to the board. The estimates were carefully considered and were adopted at this meeting, not on the final day, as Mrs. Hunt asserts."

"The minutes of these proceedings, including the original draft of the estimates, were in the hands of the secretary so that Mrs. Hunt has no excuse for her ignorance on the matter. I am sure that Mrs. Hunt will feel that she has done the advisory industrial committee a great injustice, which I feel she will be the first to desire to rectify, and I trust that the Free Press will give the same publicity to the correction of this impression that it has given to the original statement."

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EXTENSION WORK OF UNIVERSITY TO BE REORGANIZED

Western Will Add Many New Courses of Wide Variety.

At a recent meeting of the board of governors of Western University the report of the extension board upon ways and means of greatly enlarging the extension activities of the university was adopted. The various clauses of the report will be of interest to the general public.

All the extension work of the university shall be organized into one department, to be known as "extension department" of Western University.

The department shall be under the direction of a committee of not more than nine members, consisting of officers of the university and representatives of the various extension departments.

The extension department shall be appointed for three years.

The extension department shall undertake the following lines of effort:

(a) Correspondence courses, (b) popular lecture courses in local centres, (c) tutorial classes or systematic instruction in definite courses or subjects, (d) short courses for people at the university and at other convenient points, (e) cooperation with the Workers' Educational Association, Farmers' Club, Women's Institutes, Municipal Associations, scientific or other societies, (f) providing reading, lecture and study courses, demonstrations, clinics, etc., (g) by means of better equipped for the development of the extension work of the university.

The extension department shall make provision for the maximum educational service to the people of Western Ontario, and shall endeavor to bring the university to the people of the province.
