KITCHENER INTER-COUNTY JUNIORS OPEN SEASON IN GALT ON MAY 31st

Residence Regulation is Decided on

A meeting of the Junior Inter-County League held at the Central Hotel Preston on last evening delegates were present from Galt, Hespeler, Waterloo, Kitchener. The list of officers was gone over and approved by all present.

The following are rules adopted and approved by all: 1st that the league be called "The Junior Inter-County League."

2nd. That all players must be residents by March 1st, bankers, students, returned soldiers, and sailors excepted. 3rd. That each club be allowed to use not more than three men over-age. 4th.—That each club deposit \$10.00 for entry fee.

5th.—That the home Club to supply the umpire and if not satisfactory, the visiting team to bring along an umpire. Umpires to be selected and reported to Secretary of League before opening game. 6th.—The National League rules to govern all games.

7th.—The Spaulding Official League Ball to be used by all teams, and each club must supply a new ball at each game. 8th.—All protests to be handed within 48 hours to the executive.

9th All games to be played not later than Aug. 23.

10th.—Winners of first schedule to play off with winners of second schedule, two games out of three to decide the champion.

ANOTHER LEAF PITCHER GOES TO LEWISTON

Pitcher Frank Quinn, the diminutive pitcher who tried out with the Toronto Leafs and was afterwards released to the London club of the Michigan-Ontario League refused to report to London and has turned up in his home town Bayonne N.J. He wired Toronto headquarters for instructions and was told to report to the Lewiston team, club of the New England League, which club is owned by "Bill" Carrigan, former Toronto catcher and afterward Manager of the world champion Boston Americans.

Pitcher Albeide was also released to London but finally landed with Lewiston. Both pitchers are from Bayonne, N.J. and will again be teammates under the ownership of Carrigan.

George Westlake the Toronto outfielder who was signed by the Leafs has been offered a berth in the Kitchener M.O. League outfield and will report to that club if satisfactory arrangements can be made with the Toronto management.

Friday will be Empire Day. All receipts above the guarantee sum to the club go to the soldier fund of the Daughters of the Empire. The latter are preparing a fitting program. The band will head a procession to the park. The monument in Victoria Park will be decorated and there will also be speeches. After the crowds will proceed to the ball grounds.
