Orenda strike to last "as long as necessary"

Some 1,280 members of ocal 717, International Association of Machinists and Aerospace Engin-eers, walked off the job in a legal strike against Orenda Ltd., Malton, at 12.01 a.m. Friday, July 5. Negotiations broke off

at 6 p.m. July 4 and at press time no further meetings between company and union repre-sentatives were scheduled.

Although a wide range of fringe benefits are at stake, the key issue is wages. The company has offered an increase of 18 cents an hour over a twoyear contract - 10 cents the first year, 8 cents the second. The union has demanded a 70 cent per hour increase in a one-

year contract. Another main issue is the employee lay-off ben-efit plan. The old contract provided \$20 a week for 13 weeks to a layed-off employee. The company has offered \$40 per week for 61/2 weeks but insists

Assaults on police increase

Official Mississauga Police reaction to an apparent increase in frequency of attacks on po-lice officers is one of concern, but not of emotion.

"We are always deeply concerned when a police officer is assaulted," said Deputy Chief Bruce Kiv-

Instructions to patrol officers about the use of force, billy sticks, and pistols has not changed, according to Mr. Rivell. always, policeman will be instructed to use the minimum force necessary to pursue the proper course of justice,"

he said. There There have been no special orders to "get tough" with offenders. Patrols have not been increased in numbers or in size. "We can only do our jobs, then pass these peo-ple along to the courts," Mr. Kivell said.

"There isn't a plant in the country that hires more skilled people than Orenda," said Mr. Mc-Millan. "And yet they have dropped off 300 employees in the properties." ployees in the past eight months. Some of these machinists had over 20 years seniority."

Mr. McMillan described the company offer as "utterly ridiculous considering rising costs and the settlements in other industries.

The union is "preparing for a long strike if necessary", said McMillan. In the past, local 717 has sent donations to any striking Canadian Labor Congress lodges in need of funds and it is expecting similar support from other CLC locals and the international union if its own strike fund becomes depleted.

Each willing striker has been assigned one four-hour picket shift approximately every eight days. The instructions to each picket are "no drinking, keep moving." The strike will proceed with "everything in accordance with the law," according to Mr. Mc-Millan.

In its first few days, the strike was controlled and peaceful.
