CAT STEVENS AT MASSEY HALL
 The key to Cat Stevens appeal in concert, is energy. He overflows with it, and the reaction is dynamite.

The law of Karma, (where you get back what you give) is the only way I can describe the feelings put out by Stevens to audience and vice versa. I got the impression that Sunday night's show at Massey Hall was the most important concert he had ever given and was told by one of those travelling with him that it's the same way, every time he steps on stage.

When a performer has that much respect for his audience, (sadly enough there are many who don't), the audience can sense it, and feels they are part of a very personal thing. Sunday night we were.

Stevens, assisted by Alan Davies on acoustic guitar and vocals, sang songs from his three albums on A&M, (all million sellers) and introduced some new tunes. Now everybody has their favorite tunes but when Stevens did *If I Laugh*, I was completely mesmerized. His vocals soar from hushed whispers to a booming bass voice at the turn of a phrase and his drummer and bassist provided a very subtle bottom that allowed him the freedom he needed.

The sound was superb, another first for a rock concert and the Claire Brothers deserve a great deal of thanks for this. Stevens is a very amiable chap and his limited comments between tunes presented him as a very down to earth person, who takes his music, not himself,

seriously. Tom Jans and Mimi Farina opened the show and these two seasoned performers did an excellent job of getting things going. Jans has been around the folk circuit for quite a few years and is an excellent guitarist. Mimi Farina, became something of a minor legend when her husband, Richard Farina, died. She's Joan Baez's younger sister and her anti war comments showed she's learned her lessons well.

What Leon Russell gave us was excitement, in the highest degree. What Cat Stevens gives is himself, which is more exciting to begin with. That he does it so unselfishly and without restraint, is even better yet.

I felt Sunday like I was in my living room listening to a friend play some tunes. I was relaxed and at peace with the world, and isn't that what it's all about.


