Free Liberty therein to go to whom you I leave, and be honestly and kindly dealt withall, as to the French indeav-: puring to detain you from forming here, you may depend as we have before Said that you Shall meet in all Imaginable good wage from us, and we are thankfull for your resolution to forme here and you may be well informed and afoured that you fan buy more for , bever w. us than for 3 w. the French, and we do Fellyou that the Two great Kings of England and France are in Leace and in Such an alliance that all Nations in their Dominions may have Free Liberty To Trade over the Same without Molestation of French or English -

There is to acquaint your cay that the Two Indian Messengers whom we Vent last Gandda are returned the 20. ull and gave us an ace as followeth that when they fame at Gachnawaga fautle the Indians Told them that there was great Lieper ations making for a War and that There was a great number of Battoes made at an Island belonging · to Mone Laquelle, and our Messengers haveing not as yet Veen them, therefore, as hed some of the fachnawaga indians to go out a Tishing w. Them in regards that they thought that Itwould be more Satisfactory to the form. that if at their return they Could Inform them that they had veen them, and as they went to Fish and fame to the aforevaids I oland they derived the Pachnawaga Indians, that they might go ashow upon the Island and Imoak a Lipe w them in they accordingly did and then Vaw upon the vivilands a fonsiderable number of Prattoes which in the best ofour Me frengeres Judgen! Exceeded a hundred in Number, and were Further Informed that there was a great many more made down the river and Elsewhere and Further our Messengers Inform us that the French have Trepared a house Full of bread and were still busie to bake more and that their design is to Take ofwego, for that house is do great a Detriments to them as they Vay and that they was
