IN CONCLUSION.

We have no startling announcement to make; but we can assure all our contributors that good is being done through the funds they have placed at our disposal. May we beseech everyone interested in the Redeemer's Kingdom to make this Society the especial object of prayer? There is no evangelizing organization that reaches so many who are strangers to evangelical religion as this Society. There is no agency which so widely distributes the printed Gospel in the destitute sections of the Maritime Provinces, and no scheme can be devised by which money spent can do a greater amount of evangelizing work than the Colporteur scheme of this Society.

FORM OF A BEQUEST TO THE SOCIETY.

I give and Bequeath to the "British American Book and Tract Society," instituted in Halifax, Nova Scotia, in the year 1867, the sum of Dollars, to be paid out of personal Estate to the Treasurer for the time being, whose receipt shall be a sufficient discharge for the same.

Bequests may be general, and left to the discretion of the Committee to be disposed of as they may consider best; or *special*, to be applied to any one of the following schemes:—Colportage—Gratuitous distribution among the destitute,—the Publication Fund or Capital,—or for providing a Building for the Society.
