William Stewart to Neilson. Asking his advice as to the probability of the success of a petition for annulling the election for Bytown, on the ground of executive interference. Bytown, 10th April, 1841.

Sir Allan N. MacNab to Neilson (Circular). Announcing his candidature for the Speakership of the Assembly of the Province. Dundurn, 10th April, 1841.

Wm. Hamilton Merritt to Neilson. (Private and confidential). Enquiring as to his views on certain measures to be laid before the Legislature at the approaching session. It is assumed Neilson and associates will move for repeal of union. Upper Canada strong for union. He himself will support every measure, containing the principles of Lord Durham's policy. Observes *Quebec Gazette* supports the principle of this policy. Sees no reason why Neilson should not be associated with the party aiming at peace and prosperity, and maintenance of connection with Great Britain. Candidates for Speakership.
