

DEATH A SURPRISE

Physicians Thought Mr. Cox Was Out of Danger and Planned to Let Him Spend a Few Weeks at the Seaside.

London, June 28.—E. W. Cox, president and general manager of the Canadian Life Insurance Company, and leading Canadian financier, died Saturday, after a short illness. Mr. Cox, accompanied by Dr. Harry Goldsmith, also of Toronto, left the Hotel Metropole, London, for the Imperial Hotel, Hythe, Kent, last Wednesday. The day before his departure, Dr. Goldsmith was sufficiently satisfied with his patient's condition to authorize the statement that both Mr. Cox and himself intended to spend a few weeks at the seaside before returning home.

INCUBATORS FAIL

Death Results in a Great Majority of Cases, Says Atlantic City Physician.

Atlantic City, June 28.—The 3,500 members of the American Medical Association were busy to-day attending the many sectional meetings arranged for an exchange of views on public health. This year's session already has taken higher ground with regard to recommendations than in any previous year. The higher standard for entrance into medical schools and the general co-operation of the practitioner and layman is another. Unrelenting war on nostrums is still another. Probably the most radical suggestion yet made is that the public welfare would be best served if every man, woman and child were subjected to a compulsory examination as to physical fitness once in every year.

The infant incubator has been more of a failure than a success in the hands of Dr. E. Chapin, of New York, reported in a paper before the section on diseases of children. Out of 15 personal experiences with the incubator for infants he could not report one satisfactory result, death resulting in the great majority of instances. He urged that the house of delegates be asked to declare against its further use.

He advocated obligatory insurance for the aged and similar to that of Germany, provision of industrial colonies.

THE POPE LIQUIDATION

Boston, Mass., June 28.—The bid of \$1,800,000 which the Boston bank made for the assets of the Pope Manufacturing Company in Connecticut and Massachusetts has been withdrawn. As no other bidders are likely to appear, it seems probable that the properties will have to be liquidated by the receivers for what they will bring.

As the bulk of the assets in Connecticut are in real estate and machinery and as there is a surplus of idle Connecticut factories already on the market for sale, it would seem as if the liquidation process would be a slow one and would make it difficult for holders of Pope Manufacturing preferred stock, now selling at 50 cents per share, to save anything in the process.

FEWER BIRTHS IN FRANCE.

Lowest Ever Recorded Last Year Except in 1911.

Paris, June 28.—In France 5,112 fewer babies were born in 1913 than in 1912, according to official figures made public to-day. This is the lowest birth rate ever recorded in the country except in 1911.
