The Boy Scouts left on the 6.33 train this morning for Hamilton, where they will take part in the manoeuvres to-day.

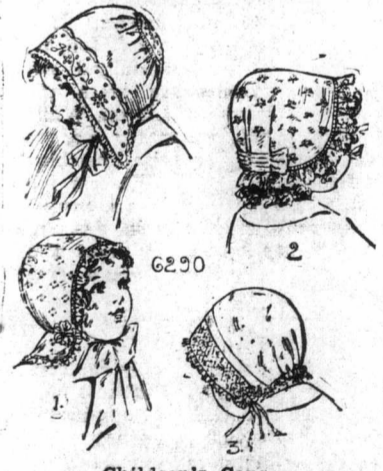

**Children's Caps.**

Three styles of caps are shown in this illustration. No. 1 can be developed in two different ways, as shown in the picture; Nos. 2 and 3 are seamless and are cleverly drawn in to the shape of the head. Lawn, silk, batiste and the like are used for caps.

The cap pattern, No. 6,200, is cut in sizes 1, 2 and 3 years. Two-year size requires for No. 1, 1/2 yd of 27 inch material, with 2 1/4 yards of edging; No. 2 requires 3/4 yard of 27 inch material, 2 1/4 yards of edging and 5/8 yard of ribbon; No. 3 requires 1/2 yard of 27 inch material, 3/4 yard of insertion, 3 yards of edging.
