A VISIT TO POULTRY SHOW

The Brantford Pet Stock Association exhibit in the old Hamilton building, was the mecca of the fancier last night.

The Courier man never by any stretch of imagination, could be such a crowd, nevertheless he obtained one and crossing the threshold was greeted by 'Stan,' the energetic secretary-'Stans' all right. You'd never know to meet him, in ordinary life he is a secretary for such an aggregation of feathered faculty-he never 'crows' about it. Just at that instant the 'crowd' broke its self-same voice that in ages of old had startled the penitent Peter-the pheasants gurgled and pigeons cooed; there was a fluttering as of might and main, and the 'crowd' began to be agitated.

'Leghorns strong this year?' an agricultural individual asserted, and they looked healthy enough. Each bird balanced on its uprights, and though many of them weren't particularly as to how they paraded their toilet-still they were from the country, such 'braves' as 'Wentworth,' 'Woodstock,' etc., and it is noticeable that the behaviour of local feathered exhibits was, to say the least more circumspect.

'Braw beauties,' commented a Scotch wife. 'Gran' eating,' said her better half with a longing eye on a Scotch breed of Columbian wyandottes. The progress of these poultry experts was to observe, and their little remark considerably added to the newsman's knowledge by his queries and ready comment.

'Haw, now, look at the 'broncho' crapping,' and a hasty rush of people to view such a species disclosed a really lovely bird labelled 'English crapping,' and a murmur from the crowd and a chirp crack as of palm on check and a hastening to another distant part of the building, was then made.

The creatures were magnificent. Never in our palmyest chicken suppers did we picture the food with such beautiful wrappings. Barred rocks sedately eyed the paper and pencil; Poland, with millinery that would grace any 'chicken,' smiled; and a Muscovy drake, with his varied red and gorgeous headpiece disdainfully allowed his tail to wag in our direction for comment and inspection, that bird didn't come from anywhere but Berlin-that's evident.

MR. WESTBROOK'S SUIT FOR \$95,000 IS IN PROGRESS

Before Mr. Justice Lennox in the Non-Jury Assize yesterday in Toronto the action of Fred Westbrook of Brantford against W. P. Kernahan, W. H. Garvey, and Edith Florence Dryden was started. The action is for \$95,000, alleged due as commission by the defendants for the sale of stock of the O'Leary Brewery Company, and also for services rendered in connection with the purchase of breweries at Port Arthur, Sudbury and the Soo.

The stock in question was that owned by the estate of the late Widener Hawke, and the 12,000 shares were valued at \$950,000. Mr. Kernahan, manager of the O'Leary Brewery, and the two other defendants were executors of the Hawke estate. Mr. Westbrook claims that he was approached by the defendants to see if he could find a purchaser for the Hawke stock. He says that he was the means of the transfer of the stock to Mr. Cawthra Mulock and Mr. Charles Millar, and was also instrumental in getting Messrs. Mulock and Millar to forego the purchase of the three breweries in the north district.

The defendants deny that the plaintiff was their agent in any way. The case is being continued to-day.

Their Attempt Was Expected And Checked

[By Special Wire to the Courier] LONDON, Nov. 25-The Russian attempt to turn the German flank at Wierlun Pass was expected and checked, says the Times' Petrograd correspondent.

The difficulties of the Russian operations in Poland were enormously aggravated by the havoc the Germans wrought during their retreat from Warsaw. A Russian Slovo correspondent who visited the scene says it is difficult to find a solitary foot of undamaged railroad bed for hundreds of versts. The scene, he declares, suggests the visitation of a tremendous typhoon or earthquake.

The destruction of the country runs from Warsaw to near Kutno, where the destruction becomes less complete.

The commencement of the bombardment of the Czeow forts bears out the official Russian reports that the Russians are approaching the fortress from three directions, namely, Mieschow, Wolnicz and New Sando.
