TWO DEAD AND MANY INJURED IN BAD BLAZE

Apartment House in Cleveland Burned by an Incendiary.

Cleveland, O., March 28.—Fire, which swept through an apartment house in Prospect Avenue early today, causing the death of two persons and injury to more than a score of others, was of incendiary origin, according to police and detectives.

Police early today were holding three men and one woman at headquarters and had established a police guard at the bedside of Bessie Reimer at Huron road hospital.

The "Reimer girl" is as much under arrest as any of the other four," said Detective Barrett. "We are convinced that she knows who started the fire last night as well as a fire yesterday morning in her room."

Nearly all of the five were involved in a white slave investigation a few days ago, following which one woman was sent to the work house. In this case the Reimer girl was the alleged victim.

The dead man was identified as J. B. Lewis, forty two, who is said to have a wife and three children in New York City. He was employed as a solicitor on the Cleveland city directory. The dead woman was identified as Mrs. Elizabeth Simpkins, 50, saleswoman in a Euclid avenue store.
