Harry Simmonds of Amherst  
have been spending the past  
week in town seeing old friends.A big break in the sugar mar-  
ket has resulted in a decrease of  
75 cents a barrel in the United  
States and 40 cents a barrel in  
Canada. This falling off, some  
of the dealers think, is  
only the beginning of a gradual  
more pronounced decline to  
come later. One dealer said that  
he considered the market very  
weak, and would not buy, de-  
spite the reduction. The out-  
look in Cuba for a good crop  
this year is exceptionally prom-  
ising, and this is believed to be  
one of the chief factors in  
bringing about a reversal of  
prices. American competition is  
more keen in the sugar business  
and this is given as one of the  
reasons why the price there  
reached a lower level than on  
this side of the border. The  
Canadian refineries, fewer in  
number, have combined for  
their own good, and the com-  
petition that has helped to low-  
er prices in America, has not  
been felt here with all dealers  
affiliated.**Bulgarians Retreating**Paris, Sept. 12.—The Petit

have evacuated all the forts at  
the Greek sea port of Kavala,  
which they occupied last month.  
The forts are said to have been

September 15 and the season is  
open till March 1.Partridges, if there are any,  
can be shot only from October  
1 to November 1.Deer can be shot from Octob-  
er 21 to October 31; only one  
can be shot by each hunter; no

Lieut. Gavin Stairs, son of Gav-  
in Stairs, of this city, killed in

and leaves soon for New York  
with Mrs. Lieb, who has been at  
Kentville for 3 months. Major  
Lieb will join another Battalion

unfit and 108 civilians, princi-  
pally relatives of officers and  
men. The party includes  
Major Gregory, of Nova Scotia,  
who is to recruit a new battery
