Search for the Missing. Till noon today it was supposed that the fire had merely meant a loss of property and that the only persons who were endangered were Edgar Coates and John Jones, who were most dramatically rescued from the roof of the burning building. But shortly after noon relatives of the night watchman, F. Whittal, made in quiries, and stated that since the fire nothing had been heard of him and his family, although they had their residence on the fifth floor of the

Inquiries proved fruitless. Then i was realized that the fire had proved a real holocaust and that the entire family had perished.
