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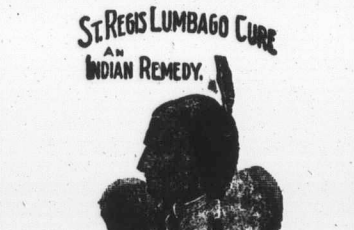

The Weight of Bread

On July 1st the act respecting the standard weight of bread came into force in Ontario. All bread other than fancy bread must weigh either one and one-half pounds, or three pounds per loaf. Fancy bread must weigh either sixteen or 20 ounces per loaf, and have affixed to the bottom of the loaf a label showing the name of the maker, the weight of the loaf and that the bread is fancy bread.

NEW G. T. R. EQUIPMENT

The Grand Trunk Railway System are now putting into service 13 new coaches of 25 that have been ordered for assignment to trains on international runs, viz., between Chicago and New York via Niagara Falls, Chicago and Montreal, Montreal and Portland, and Toronto and Buffalo. The cars are known as first-class day coaches, and are of the standard pattern which the Grand Trunk operate on all their through trains. Length of cars over all 75 feet 6 inches, weight of each car 108,620 pounds. They are mounted on six wheel trucks, are wide vestibule with steel platforms, and are constructed with the empire style of roof. Seats are Grand Trunk standard with high backs; the car seating 60 people, is upholstered in green plush, while the smoking room is large and roomy and upholstered in leather. All modern conveniences have been installed for the comfort of passengers. The body of the car is carpeted, and the passageways and smoking room covered with Linoleum.

NEWS FROM SASKATCHEWAN

Prairie Rose, July, 8rd, 1908. Editor of Reporter. Dear Sir,—Thinking that a letter from here might interest your readers I will write you a few lines.

We had as nice a winter here as I ever saw. Drove a buggy until the 20th of January, and there was only one blizzard during the whole winter, and that only lasted half a day. We had a very early spring. Seeding was started about the 14th of April and nearly completed by the 24th of May, although a few farmers did some seed in June. May was rather dry, but we had plenty of rain in June and where good seed was sown the crops are fine. Wheat is from 20 to 30 inches high. But where frosted seed was sown the outlook is not so bright.

The local improvement council are opening up the roads and grading some of them, and the country is forming into school houses built near here this summer, and we expect there will be another before fall.

New settlers are arriving all the time. The grading is completed on the railway south of us and it is expected trains will be in operation by the middle of August. There will be a town within 8 miles and another within 12 miles of us, which makes the outlook bright for an increase in the value of real estate. At present land is selling at from \$13 to \$17 per acre around here.

BLowing BUBBLES.

Use a Paper Cone and Make Them Five Feet in Circumference.

Bubble blowing is an amusement that all of us enjoyed in our early days. It was a diversion that was good for both indoors and out of doors, but there is more real enjoyment when you make scientific preparation for the blowing, for there is a science in blowing bubbles.

The best thing so far discovered for the blowing is a paper cornucopia, and with it bubbles can be blown which will measure three, four or even five feet in circumference, provided the right kind of solution is used. All sorts of tricks can then be done, such as displaying a bubble with a bouquet or a spinning top inside of it. Some persons have become so expert that they can place three or four bubbles inside one another, brightening the effect very much by filling the small bubble in the center with tobacco smoke. Blowing a pin wheel around inside of a bubble always elicits a great deal of applause from the on-lookers.

The solution that you use is, of course, very important. Ordinary water and soap do not possess the elasticity for making big bubbles. The best solution found so far is made by filling a quart bottle half full of distilled or soft water. Sift into it four-fifths of an ounce of castile soap powder and then turn it slowly at right angles while you take it away. If there is a film on the opening, you are ready to blow; if not, dip again. Blow gently through the small end, move the horn quickly to one side, and it will be free to float in the air. Some blowers become so dexterous that they can produce a large bubble filled with smoke and then divide it into two bubbles with a fan without letting the smoke escape. Great fun can be had by tossing the bubbles back and forth with felt hats, as they do not burst them. A bubble may be tossed back and forth as many as 100 times if a little care is taken.

It is interesting to place some of the solution in a frying pan, heat it a little and then blow a bubble in the center of the pan. The bubble will not burst, and in a few minutes the liquid within the bubble will begin to boil. Dip the mouth of a goblet into the solution and then remove it with the opening covered with a film. On this film blow a bubble with the cornucopia until a large one is balanced on top of the glass; then carefully remove the horn, and you will gain a truly admirable effect—Pathfinder.

The Salt-peter Man.

The salt-peter man of the first half of the seventeenth century was hated even more, if that be possible, than the "window peeper" of those more recent days when light was subject to heavy taxation. Before the importation of salt-peter from abroad as an important ingredient in the manufacture of gun-powder it was a crown monopoly, and agents, popularly known as salt-peter men, were sent all over the country to seek for it in stables, pigeon coots, pigsties and indeed in almost all other places the soil of which was supposed to be impregnated with animal matter. The injury these men did and the irritation they caused by digging up floors and pulling down fences were great. No householder was free from their visits, which were rendered especially odious from their being empowered to impress carts and horses for the purpose of carrying away the mineral and the utensils employed in its manufacture. This galling domestic tyranny, though, of course, not to be compared with things of far greater moment—was no doubt one of the factors in the national irritation which made the civil war possible. The monopoly was put an end to by parliament in 1656—London Athenaeum.

Love Potions in the Middle Ages.

In a lecture delivered before the Association of Surgeons of Munich by Professor Klein on the subject of narcotics the speaker said that the process of reducing the sensibilities of patients with a view to making operations painless was known and practiced in the middle ages. The narcotic was known then as a "love potion," and recipes for compounding it have come to us from our ancestors. Professor Klein said that the story of "Tristan and Isolde" showed that the love potion was only a narcotic. Bishop Theodorus of Chyrvira wrote a pre-powder for a pain destroyer in the twelfth century which contained opium, morphine and hyasum. A medical work printed in 1460 contains the first known treatise on inhalation, and we now inject under the skin the soothing mixture which in 1460 was inhaled. A love potion prescribed in 1497 by Hieronymus of Braunschweig contained opium and a number of useless ingredients. Many of the mixtures known as love potions were lost in the course of the Thirty Years' war and were rediscovered later to serve again in the field of science.
