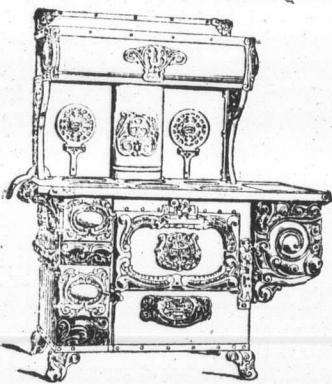

ATHENS PROTEST THROWN OUT

Those interested in the contesting teams of Division No. 1, of the Leeds County League have, so far, been treated to a number of the thrills of surprise, which are the special features of interest in hockey, to both contestants and supporters.

When the Athens team went to Westport on Jan. 4th, and gently trimmed the cup-holders with a score of 5-2, a thrill of surprise ran through Division No. 1, which was further accentuated on the 7th, when Newboro team went down to defeat, in Athens, under a score of 8-2.

On the 14th, Athens gracefully acknowledged a defeat at the hands of the cup-holders, after a warmly contested game in Athens, in which the splendid condition of the Westport boys enabled them to gain a victory of 8-3.

On January 21st, Athens went to Newboro, confident of their ability to carry home the laurel wreath, but a wreath of mourning was already prepared for them, and also a surprise that is holding them yet. "How was it done?" is the question that not only the Athens team, but many other hockey enthusiasts are asking. It is a question that the Athens team decided should be answered by the executive of the L.C.H.L., and forthwith communicated with the Secretary for instructions. These instructions were followed to the very letter and a protest was entered on Tuesday the 24th.

On Wed. 25th, the Secretary (Mr. Adams, Westport) notified the President of the Athens Hockey Club that a meeting to consider the protest would be held in Westport on the evening Friday the 27th. This notification was by telephone and sent in the presence of the President of the League (Mr. J. Gallagher, Newboro). The Secretary further informed the President of the Athens Club that he had notified the delegates of the other teams in the L.C.H.L., but there were only the three teams interested. Just what the Secretary meant is hard to determine, when viewed in the light of what transpired on Friday night, when the Athenian delegates received the thrill of thrills at the opening of the meeting about 8:30 p.m.

The delegates met in the I. O. O. F. hall and, as should be the case in such a room, the dove of peace soared over the heads of those present, carrying the olive branch which it waved triumphantly before perching upon the arch under which the president took the chair. The delegates present were only those from Elgin, Newboro, Athens and Westport. The Secretary read the protest covering the grounds of complaint of Athens vs. Newboro and laid protest before the President, who immediately declared that the protest was not official, as the Secretary of the Newboro Club had not received official notification from the Secretary of the L.C.H.L. Why not? This is one of the questions not answered satisfactorily as yet.

The President gave his ruling that no protest was entered, and supported his position by quoting O.H.A. laws from a book (not of 1910-11, but of some previous year) which he declared to be official. Delegates from Elgin asked that it be put to the meeting, as to whether Athens Club should suffer for the mistake, or negligence of the Secretary of the league, but was overruled by the President. If the President of the L.C.H.L. is endowed with such autocratic power, where was the rule book supporting his position? He admitted being present at the time that the Secretary notified the Athens Club of the meeting. He also admitted that he had at that time, made up his mind to throw out the protest as unofficial. Why did he authorize the meeting if he were acting in good faith as President of the L.C.H.L.? When asked that question he declared that the meeting was called as a business meeting. If so, why were the Clubs of the L.C.H.L. not notified to that effect? It is quite evident that the Athenians made a great mistake in expecting an impartial hearing and judgment from the executive of the L.C.H.L., and they will be better prepared in the future and deliver by hand or special messenger any communication necessary.—Com.

DEATH OF HENRY HAWKINS

On Wednesday afternoon last, Henry C. Hawkins died at his home here, aged 71 years. For several months he had been in poor health and this termination of his illness was not a surprise to his friends.

Deceased was born at Beale's Mills and had spent nearly his whole life in this section. At the outbreak of the civil war in the United States he and his brother Edgar both enlisted in the Northern army, and during the latter part of his life he was in receipt of a pension from the U. S. government.

As a young man he was distinguished by his powers of endurance and agility, and many stories are told of his performances on land and water. His wife (nee Hannah Lasher) died less than a year ago. He is survived by a family of six sons and four daughters, namely: Hiram and George, Flint, Mich.; William, Adam, Edward and Charles, Athens; Mrs. Hiram Hawkins, Smith's Falls; and Mrs. Fred Rockwood, Mrs. Herbert Kilborn and Mrs. Thos. Kavanagh, of Athens.

About twenty-five years ago Mr. Hawkins was converted at a Salvation Army meeting and always remained true to that religious organization. The funeral service was held in the Methodist church on Sunday morning and was very largely attended. An impressive sermon was preached by the pastor, Rev. F. A. Read, and the remains were then borne to their last resting place by I. C. Alguire, G. W. Beach, Joseph Thompson, T. S. Kendrick, W. C. Smith and I. Witte.

Mrs. H. Slack and children are visiting her parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. Danby, Lyndhurst.

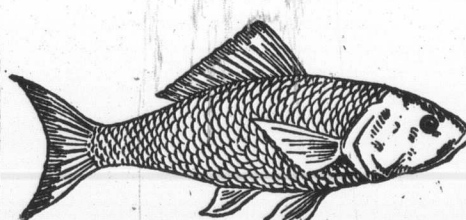
John Foster, Sr., has recovered from his illness.
