FRANCE SENDS CRUISERS. Will Make a Demonstration to Bring President Castro to Time.

President Castro to lime.

Parls, Oct. 18.—The departure of the armored cruiser Desaix from Cherbourg Monday for the Island of Martinique, French West Indies, maugurates the preparations for dealing with the Venezuelan question with a strong hand if President Castro persists in his present course. The Desaix will be found to the property of the present course. stop at Brest, where she will be joined stop at Brest, where she will be Jolied by the cruisers Lavoisier and Chasseloup-Laubat. The three warships will proceed together to the French West Indies, joining the cruisers Jurien De La Graviere and Troude, now at Martinique. This will give the division five ships under Admiral Levoe Le Lapeyrere.

The duration of the voyage to Fort de France will be about two weeks. Therefore time remains for Presiden Castro to make explanations. It is understood that the demonstration if finally resorted to will take the form of a blockade of Venezuelan ports.

London, Oct. 18.—A spot alongside Garrick's grave in the Poet's Corner, Westminster Abbey, has been selected for the burial of Sir Henry Irving, whose body will therefore lie directly beneath the statue of Shakespeare. The bodies of Dr. Johnson and Charles Dickens are nearby. King Edward will be represented at the funeral. Twelve hundred cards of admission to the abbey will be issued.

Deliveries of live stock on the City Cattle Market from the C. P. R. and G. T. R. since Thursday last are 105 loads, composed of 1730 cattle, 1339 hogs, 2307 sheep and lambs, 103 calves and 5 horses.

Exporters—Of exporters there were very few offered, and there were few wanted. A number of extra choice lotts of butchers cattle, and classed as such, were practically of export quality, and in some markets would have been sold as such. One lot of five classed as exporters, and weigning 1400 lbs. each, were fold at \$3.85 per cwt. There were a number of extra good lots of short-keep feeders, weighing up to 1150 lbs, bought for distillery feeding, and for which from \$3.65 to \$3.85 was pald.

Butchers—While the market was firmer all round, the improvement was more noticeable in the extra good butcher cattle than in any other grade. For really choice stuff the market was firm at from \$3.60 to \$4.15 per cwt. but no higher figures were paid on the City Cattle Market yesterday, or, at least, reported. The bulk of good, selected batchers was sold at from \$3.75 to \$4. For medium butchers the demand was fair, but of this class there was no overplus, and all offerings were cleaned up in good time. Medium butchers sold all the way from \$2.75 to \$3. per ewt. Canners were quoted all the way from \$1.75 to \$2.25 par awt.
