Since the defeat of the German

fleet in the Gulf of Riga, the news

from that front has been very encouraging. It was thought that the Russians, freed from this German menace on their right flank and rear would at last make their great stand against the Germans. Still, however the Kaiser's hordes continue to advance, and still the Russians keep falling back before them . Grand Duke Nicholas has averted anything in the nature of a disaster. He has withdrawn his armies intact, and vet has never lost touch with the enemy. Where opportunity has offered he has compelled the Germans to pay the maximum cost for their advance; but his general plan has been to fail back as soon as the enemy forces were concentrated for a decisive battle. There is no denying the importance of the German rains, and to have moved such an enormous army across Poland as they have done is in itself a wonderful feat of arms. At the same time people are beginning to ask themselves if the Russiau commander has not some big counter stroke in mind. The Germans have gained an enormous exan appalling price for it in men's lives, and they have neither crippled nor destroyed the Russian armies. Bad weather will shortly be upon them, and with weakened forces The Daily Herald they have merely increased the length of the lines they have to hold.
