## Correspondence.

DEAR SIR:—

Our attention has been called to a communication in your issue of the 24th inst. over the signature of N. McKay, Clerk of Presbytery. We must express our surprise and indignation at the character and contents of that article.

It is a gross misrepresentation of the facts of the case and does grave injustice to the Rev. A. F. Thomson; and it is an insult to St. Luke's Church.

He says that fifty-five persons of whom thirty-nine are communicants, have positively withdrawn from the services of the church. This assertion is simply false. It is true that fifty-five names are appended to a document asking Presbytery to try to effect a settlement of the trouble in St.

congregation; but of these fifty-five several persons have no connection with the congregation, a number of them are school children, a number more have not for years paid anything for church support, while several of them have not been in church for years. The list of names on that document only shows how insignificant the number is of those who are opposed to Mr. Thomson and who are causing all the trouble in St. Luke's. On the day on which Presbytery met, after a large number of Mr. Thomson's friends had gone home a vote of the congregation was taken when only twenty persons voted against Mr. Thomson and seventy six voted for him. A petition signed by one hundred and twenty communicants and one hundred and fourteen adherents and the number on the list being easily increased was presented to Presbytery urging that court to discontinue any agitation which might have in view the removal of Mr. Thomson; and ample assurances were given that his salary would be paid in future as it had been in the past.

McKay's figures as to the amount of money paid by the communicants are exaggerated. He refers to the investigation made before Presbytery. We were present and heard the charges made, and we also heard Mr. Thomson's reply; and in our opinion he most successfully and completely met and confronted every charge; and to day the congregation as a whole has entire confidence in Mr. Thomson as a Christian and as a minister of the Gospel. It would be a great mistake for him to resign the charge of the congregation at the present time.

To the Editor of the Advocate:—

At the meeting of Presbytery at Newcastle on the 2nd inst. the question of publishing anything in connection with our church trouble was raised, when it was decided that nothing should be sent to the press bearing upon the matter. I imagine my surprise then when a friend called upon me yesterday and showed me a copy of Saint John Globe containing a letter copied from the Chatham World over the signature of N. McKay. I notice that Dr. McKay claims to speak by authority. I question his authority. I am convinced that in rushing into print as he has done he will find very little sympathy among the members of Presbytery. It is no wonder that Roman Catholics and others opposed to Protestant churches laugh and sneer at ministers when such a man as Dr. McKay is seen so far from himself as to appear in the public prints as he does on this occasion.

When the Presbytery at Bathurst on the 17th inst. came to a finding upon the question of our trouble I supposed myself satisfied, for the reason that I understood it to be a compromise which all the members of Presbytery agreed to accept. I am still satisfied with that finding notwithstanding Dr. McKay's ill-considered letter. It is the members of Presbytery agreed to advise me to resign, if I could see my way clear to do so, they knew perfectly well that I could not see my way clear to act on their suggestion and Dr. McKay's letter increases the difficulty.

The commissioners who represented St. Luke's Church before the Presbytery on the 17th inst. are sending to you for publication a reply to Dr. McKay. I do trust that when that and this communication are published we will see nothing more in the public prints in regard to our little church difficulty. It is too bad that the pastor and people of St. Luke's should be held up to the public view by meddlesome scribbles. Do let us have peace.
