## DUNDAS TOWN COUNCIL

SEVERAL BY-LAWS PASSED AT THE REGULAR JULY MEETING.

Landlord Merrifield, of the Osborne Hotel, Fined, and a Second Charge Against Him Stands—Other Valley City News.

Dundas, July 4.—The July meeting of the Town Council was held last evening there being present Mayor Dickson and Councillors Nevitt, Kerr, Boyle, Towns and Woodhouse.

A communication from J. W. Jardine, County Clerk, informed the Council that the town's contribution for county purposes for the current year will be \$3,000. Referred to Finance Committee.

Fred Bibby's request for permission to erect a boat house on the canal bank was referred to the Property Com- mittee.

J. J. Grafton, asked to have town water supplied to the Methodist par- sonage. Referred to Fire and Water Com- mittee.

A communication from D. W. Nelson, secretary of the Public Library Board, asking that the town grant to the Lib- rary be increased from \$300 to \$350, was referred to the Finance Committee.

Councillor Kerr introduced a by-law regulating the licensing of billiard rooms. The by-law differs from the one already in force only as regards the fee charged. The by-law provides that the fee for the first table, and \$5 for each additional table. The new law makes the charge for the first table \$20 and for each additional table, \$10. Use of tables is prohibited on Sundays, and on 11 p.m. to 6 a.m., on other days. Penalty for infraction a fine of \$50 or 21 days in jail.

Chas. Boyle introduced a by-law to enable the Council to borrow \$5,000 on a note until taxes are collected.

A new hawkers and peddlers by-law was introduced by Councillor Towns. It provides that licenses be charged for as follows:

Travelling on foot and carrying a basket, or other receptacle, \$8; travelling on foot and using a push cart, \$15; when a one horse vehicle is used, \$20; two horse vehicle, \$30. The penalty for violation of the by-law is \$50.

John H. Bertram asked to have a water meter put in at his house on Ogil- vie street. Referred to Fire and Water Committee.

Chairman Woodhouse, of the Finance Committee, reported recommending that the request of the School Board for a grant of \$15,000 for building a new High School be submitted to the ratepayers as soon as the School Board furnish neces- sary particulars. The committee also recommended that the assessor's request for \$35 additional to his salary be granted.

## A DOCTOR'S VIEW.

HE SAYS ONE THOUSAND DOLLARS CAN BE SAVED EASILY.

To the Editor of The Times:

Sir—Our taxes are still increasing, and, as usual, the aldermen continue to talk economy and practice extravagance.

When the opportunity presents itself the interest of the ratepayer are sacri- ficed for the benefit of a group of schemers, who always manage to make a fat office for one of themselves at the city's expense. It is to be hoped our aldermen will not repeat the blunder in the Health Department, the same as their predecessors did after the death of Dr. Ryall, and which is costing the city just one thousand dollars a year more than it should. In violation of all the rules and practices in other cities, by- laws were passed in the City Council to fix the
