
Canadian Sbeep **Produce Good Crop** Of Fine Wool

Canada's wool clip will total 13, 000,000 pounds with a value to sheepsmen of \$4,000,000 according to a bulletin issued by the Dominion Department of Agriculture. The quality of the product is said to be the highest in recent years. Approximately half the wool crip the bulletin estimates, will remain in Canada for manufacture. Last year the Dominion exported .6,000, 079 pounds of wool, of which the United States purchased 5,261,899 pounds and Great Britain 706,028 Sir Sefton also spoke of aircraft

Government wool grading and systematic marketing by the Cooperative Wool Growers which handles 90 per cent of the clip have raised the quality of Canadian wool, the department said.



The grand jury held that evidence in support of charges of larceny and of receiving money in the testimony of Mrs. Jean Marsant, . formerly secretary to Squires was insufficient to warrant filnding of a true bill Sir Kichard has maintained an absolute denial , of the charges aganst him or complicity in the alleged irregularities.

THE BIGGEST LOCOMOTIVE IN THE BRITISH EMPIRE



Engine No. 4100, the new freight locomotive, with new type tender, just built for the Canadian National Railways by the Canadian Locomotive Works at Kingston. It is the last word in designer's skill for lines, weight and power. Ninety-two feet in over-all length, it weighs 325 tons, and has a tractive power of 14,500 tons, or the power to move 150 loaded freight cars on a level track. Its boiler has 3,200 horsepower, or more than what is used by the civic electrical plant at Kingston, with a population of 25,000, for lighting and industrial purposes. It is the largest locomotive in the British Empire, being more than three feet longer than the famous "6000" type passenger locomotives, and 35 tons greater in weight. The tender is also an innovation. It is of rounded type, known commonly as the Vanderbilt Tender, as it was designed by the famous railroader Cornelius Vanderbilt. It is of a more simplified construction than the usual rectangular tender and it carries 11,000 imperial gallons of water and 15 tons of coal. It also has the advantage of giving greater vision to the crew for yard work. Five of these locomotives have been built for the National System. The majority will be used in transfer work in terminals.

• The remarkable progress made in the construction of motive power on Canadian railways is illustrated by comparing this giant new locomotive of the Canadian National Railways with the first railway engine used in Canada, a drawing of which is shown inset. This engine was used on the Champlain and St. Lawrence Railroad in 1837, and it was name the "Dorchester." The drawing is made from a print in the possession of the Canada Railways, Montreal.
