The Supreme Court resumed their sittings here yesterday, when Judge Hensley delivered judgment in the following Scott Act cases tried at Georgetown. Martin, appeal, \$100; Moore, appeal allowed without costs; McElroy, appeal, \$100; Clay, appeal, appeal dismissed on conviction, appeal with costs. The court refused an application to quash a conviction against Mrs. Noonan of Summerside, for breach of Scott Act. A writ nisi was obtained for a new trial in the case of Pearson v. Sheehan.

For a single trip the charge is \$2 if the passenger desires to take "a strap," which means that he will assist the boat over the ice. If he does not wish to do this the rate is \$4 on the regular boats. The latter cannot accommodate the passengers, and the former are required to be carried on the main deck and across the rail, the shore steamers near Capes Tormentine and Travers.
