LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

The new commander of Canadian Militia, Colonel Hutton, arrived at Quebec on the 19th.

Mrs. Howland has issued invitations for an At Home at Government House on Friday evening.

The Cuban question, it is feared in Spain, may yet cause serious trouble. Work on the Gibraltar fortifications has been stopped.

A REMINDER of the 22nd of Bude Pesh, says eight soldiers were drowned by the falling of a bridge near Head whilst the regiment was crossing.

The Philippine insurgents have made the situation so uncomfortable for the American troops that they are beginning to think that "there's no place like home."

BETWEEN one and two hundred prospectors have returned from Copper River, Alaska. The centre of attraction now is said to be on the American side at Forty Mile Creek.

Denials are made of the truth of the report that Andrew had been heard from. The search will be continued by all except Prof. Nordenskjöld, who will at once return from Dawson.

As two men named Korta, who were tied together, were climbing the Alps, one of them fell in a fissure and the other, to save his own life, was obliged to cut the rope and leave the other to destruction.

Up to the 20th of the present month there has been more rain than in the last three years during the same time. '84 inches fell. In 1896 the rainfall was '81; in '97, '1.69; '98, 2.97.

A PETITION has been filed against the return of Mr. Meddie Gallant, Grit member for the first district of Prince County. He is charged with corrupt practices personally and by agents.

On Thursday night last Sir Charles Tupper addressed a mass meeting at Gloucester Bay, C. B. There, as in the other places visited during his trip he was enthusiastically received by both parties.

A VANCOUVER, B. C., despatch of the 23rd says that the Conservatives met in convention for organization at Vancouver on September 2nd and 3rd. The chief speakers will be Sir C. H. Tupper and Foster.

A FORMAL ENQUIRY, ex-Commander of the British North American fleet is to be one of the Royal Commissioners to be appointed to investigate the Newfoundland French shore treaty and the requisites for making it effective.

On Friday last, at Ingle Park, Ill., Star Pointer paced a mile with running mate in 1.59. A strong breeze blowing at the time somewhat impeded his speed and hindered him from breaking his world's record of 1.59.

This week Conservative meetings will be addressed at Whitehead, Indian Head and Calgary by Hon. C. B. Foster. At Indian Head he will be supported by Hon. F. G. Haultain, Premier of the Territories, Messrs. Parley, Davin and others.

On the Grand Banks a dead body of huge proportions, supposed to be that of Yousoff, the Turkish wrestler, was passed by the Carthage. The steamer reports having also passed five other bodies wearing life belts, and a considerable quantity of wreckage.

A TERRIBLE collision of two section trains took place on Sunday night last in the Sharon, Mass., station. Twenty-five persons are injured and six killed. Amongst the latter are W. J. and Mary Fitzpatrick, Boston, C. B. Frye and Mrs. C. H. Briscoe, Revere, and F. W. Waters, Somerville, Mass.

MOUNT Vesuvius was in a state of active eruption on the 20th. Four streams of lava are flowing down the mountain side at the rate of 400 yards an hour. One chestnut tree on Mount Somma has been burned. Constant explosions are heard in the central crater, which is vomiting ashes and flames.

REGULATIONS for the disposal of the right to divert and use the water from any stream or lake, and the right of way through and to enter upon any mining ground for the purpose of constructing ditches and flumes to convey such water for mining purposes in the Yukon territory, have been adopted. Each application for the privilege must be accompanied by a deposit of \$50.

REV. FATHER REARDON, of the diocese of St. Paul, who had been spending his vacation with his friends here, preached another splendid sermon in St. Dunstan's Cathedral on Sunday last. His theme was Purgatory, and his treatment of the subject was masterly. Father Reardon is destined to make his mark as a pulpit orator, and we wish him every success in the diocese of his adoption.

A KINGSTON, Ont., despatch of August 18th says:—At the cheese board to-day, 1000 boxes were boarded. Sales, 200 colored at 8¢; 100 white at 7 1/2¢-10¢. At Brookville, Ont., August 18th, it took the bulk of the afternoon a long time to make up their minds to accept the big prices offered today at the cheese board. The registrations were chiefly August make, 1,273 boxes white and 2,239 colored. Mr. Ware saw the top prices for both kinds, and bought 250 white at 7 1/2¢-10¢, and 143 colored at 8¢.

CHURCH is on the rise in Montreal. The Gazette, of Friday, reports that business locally was fairly active and dealing in good sized lots of finest Ontario colored was put through at 8¢, while it is reported that transactions were put through over the cable at the equivalent of 8¢. The bulk of the demand, however, seemed to run to bargains in eastern makes, that is, goods that showed fair quality and were obtainable at 7¢ to 7 1/2¢, but with the advanced bids these were not easily obtainable.

SUNDAY last, being the feast of St. Joachim, solemn and appropriate services were held in the church of that name, at Vernon River. At ten o'clock solemn High Mass was celebrated by the pastor, Rev. Dr. Doyle, assisted by Rev. Dr. McGowan, as deacon, and Mr. Prang, sociologist, as sub-deacon. An appropriate and eloquent sermon was preached by Rev. Dr. Monaghan. The musical portion of the service was excellently rendered by the choir. At the offertory a solo was sung with fine effect by Messrs. Doyle of Halifax. At six o'clock in the afternoon vespers were sung. Rev. Dr. Monaghan officiating.

NEWS OF THE WEEK.

The thousandth part of a second can now be measured and recorded by Lohner, the noted Berlin watchmaker.

Whilst bathing with a companion at Winthrop beach, Mass., on the 17th, Cyrus Hicks of St. John, N. B., aged twenty-one, was drowned. His body was recovered.

Col. Hay, United States Ambassador at London, has made the following statement:—"I have been offered and accepted the post of secretary of state. I shall leave London in about a month."

On Saturday afternoon last two men James Duhan of Urbana, Hanis, 22 years of age, and a friend named Kennedy tried to ford the river on Winthrop's Falls, two miles from Stewiack, Maine. When about half way across they were overtaken by the tide and Duhan drowned.

The views of the Conservative leader at Madrid, Senor, Silvela, are given in the following:—"The capture of Manila in no wise affects the rest of the archipelago, and the commissioners should be summoned with urgency in order to prevent the world gaining the impression that Spain has no sovereignty in the Philippines. The Liberal party should conclude peace but the Sagasta cabinet cannot afford it."

Says a Vancouver despatch: Admiral Palliser has arrived on the flagship Imperieuse in connection with the formation of a volunteer navy brigade in Vancouver. This city will provide a brigade which will be used in case of war to supplement the regular seamen on the warship of the fleet of the North Pacific station. Lord Brassey and Lord Charles Bessborough will be approached on the matter when they reach Vancouver shortly, in view of the British-Russian crisis. The brigade will be put under training at once.

The Seawanhaka cup is retained by Canada, the fourth race on Lake St. Louis having been won on Wednesday last by the Dominion. The Challenger led at first, but at the end of the second round of the triangular course the Canadian yacht was one minute and forty seconds ahead.

An Ottawa despatch of the 19th says Major Walsh, Administrator of the Yukon, has written the Department of the Interior that he had left Dawson City on July 25th. On his way to the coast he will probably meet Commissioner Ogilvie, to whom he will impart much useful information acquired by him in mining experience.

Cuba and Porto Rico will soon be under American rule.

In Essex county, Ont., this season's tobacco crop, will, it is thought, be somewhat over thirteen million pounds.

A great many persons are being brought to Vancouver from the Klondyke. Most of them were disappointed in the search for gold.

Sir Herbert Murray, Governor of Newfoundland, is to be succeeded by Lieut. Col. H. E. McCallum, R. E., C. M. G., Governor of Lagos, South Africa.

The death of Gustavus Wicksteed, Q. C., D. C. L., formerly a law clerk of the old Canada then of the Dominion parliament took place at Ottawa on the 18th. He was 88 years of age.

In order to make and maintain peace in Santiago, the United States government has ordered the Tampa Fifth regular infantry and also the colored 22nd regiment of Kansas to be despatched there immediately.

As a reward for their services in the army and navy, the Spanish government has granted two hundred thousand dollars to the prisoners at Camp Long, Portsmouth, N. H. There is great rejoicing amongst them.
