Now this emendment will do away with the benefits of that item. If we produced the raw wool in this country, there would be a large amount of work in it. If we raised the sheep, first there would be the care of the sheep, the sheep is the sheep of the sheep. sheep in bringing them to a fit con dition for shearing; the carding and spinning of the wool, and then dyeing before it is brought to state which this clause provides for If this clause passes, which I have no doubt it will, the manufacturers wi knitting and about two-thirds of th money which would be spent on labo manufactured article, instead of ge ting it manufactured in this Colony and giving employment to our own this clause has been inserted; ther is no necessity for it. The labor tha will be given in weaving and manu facturing the dyed yarns will b next to nothing. The machinery will be worked almost automatically. 
