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Mr. Slattery's Lecture.
Before one of the largest audiences that ever greeted any lecturer J. L. Slattery, Esq., delivered a stirring, able and eloquent discourse at the B. I. S. Club Rooms on Tuesday night, in aid of the Sealing Disaster Fund. His subject was the momentous question of Home Rule and in this the learned lecturer was perfectly at home. He was introduced by Mr. J. C. Pippy, the chairman, who referred to the terrible disaster which at present is uppermost in everyone's mind, and for which the proceeds of the lecture are to be devoted. For over an hour the audience was treated to an exposition of the subject, most entertaining in matter, astounding in wealth of detail and eloquent in delivery. The lecturer touched on all the vital points of the question in a most masterly and forcible manner. The sentiment prevailing on the subject, the economic conditions of Ireland, the falsity of some prevailing opinions, the remarkable success and executive ability of Irishmen abroad, were a few of the points touched on. The numerous quotations from well known public men and the statistics which were never boring, showed the vast amount of trouble and research taken on the subject. There was not one in the whole audience that could not feel, but that he heard the very best from a man who had not alone a thorough grasp of the subject, but very high literary ability. If such a lecture were published it would give to the people here the whole reason for Home Rule in a nut shell. The best compliment that could be paid to the lecturer is to say that his lecture is worth white listening to a second time. Any lecture by Mr. Slattery after this is sure to be well attended. A vote of thanks was proposed by Rev. Bro. Kennedy, who referred to the happy coincidence that the lecture was delivered on the day that the Home Rule Bill had passed the critical period. He said that the time was near when some gifted Irishmen would be able to write the epitaph of Robert Emmet, which the great patriot had forbidden to be written till Ireland had emerged as a nation once again. The audience showed their appreciation in long and hearty applause. The Chairman in tendering Mr. Slattery the vote of thanks, referred to the vast influence which Irishmen have wielded in the world's affairs and said that such a people deserved Home Rule and Ireland prosper under it. The lecture closed with "A Nation Once Again," and the National Anthem, played by the lecturer's nephew, Mr. John Slattery.

THE MISSING SOUTHERN CROSS
The S. S. Southern Cross is yet unheard of and those who have relatives and friends on board are beginning to feel despondent. Last night the following wireless was received by Mr. J. R. Bennett, from the Kyle:—
"Spoke to schooner John Hammond of Gloucester, fisherman, at 6.30 a.m. anchored in lat. 43.30; long. 55.40, one hundred and eighty-nine miles S. W. by S. half S. of Cape Race; she reports seeing nothing of any steamer or sail. At noon to-day Cape Race bearing N.E. by N. half N. 24 miles. Course changed at noon to north, which will take us over edge of St. Pierre bank; barometer falling; looks for a stormy night; sorry have nothing to report; yesterday very stormy. Every man on board this ship anxiously watching, scanning the horizon for anything that might be seen; let me know if you have any news; all crew and passengers well on board."
