KEEP MINARD'S LINIMENT IN THE HOUSE.

At the City Hall.

The Chairman and full Board were present at yesterday's meeting of the Civic Commission.

The Committees for the term were announced as follows:—

Water and Sewerage—Messrs. Harris, Bradshaw, Jackman, Morris, McNamara.

Sanitary—Bradshaw, Morris and Mullaly.

Lighting—Jackman, Anderson.

Clerks and Offices—McNamara, Ayre and Anderson.

Victoria Park—Ayre, McGrath.

Bannerman Park—Withers, Harris.

West End Roads and Sidewalks—Ayre, Mullaly, McGrath.

East End Roads and Sidewalks—Jackman, Withers, Harris.

Mr. Mullaly suggested that some of the Inspectors move around on Saturday nights and enquire into the violation of the law regarding the depositing of waste matter in the streets.

The Premier, in reply to a communication referring to the condition of Waterford Bridge Road, stated that the matter was being attended to.

With reference to dumps, Mr. Ayre thought that the city was making land for private individuals, who encroached accordingly.

Mr. Harris complained of the annoyance caused the residents in the vicinity of Browning's Bridge, by the city dump in that locality.

An incinerator was suggested as a solution of the problem, with which suggestion the Chairman agreed, as he had seen satisfactory results elsewhere.

The Engineer was asked about the matter and, after considerable discussion it was decided to have the solicitor's opinion before dealing any further with the question.

The matter of substituting another dump for the one complained of was referred to the Sanitary Committee.

M. W. Furlong, solicitor for R. G. Reid, submitted plans of proposed street adjoining Forest Road, and requested that the Council open the street and lay water and sewerage.

The communication further intimated that the proposed street contained 14 lots which would in all probability be built upon.

The Engineer was instructed to outline the plan of the proposed street on the general plan of the city, so more definite knowledge may be ascertained before discussing the matter.

C. H. Bulley offered to supply improved receptacles for garbage. Not required.

H. S. Butler asked if the Board would continue the sewer to his proposed dwelling on LeMarchant Road. After a lengthy discussion it was decided that if Mr. Butler wants the service, he will have to stand the costs.

Application for repairs to houses were referred to the Engineer.

At this juncture Mr. Jackman protested against the Board having to deal with such trivial matters that could be satisfactorily done by the heads of the departments.

Many of the Board agreed with him, but Mr. Mullaly showed that they were acting in accordance with the Municipal Act.

A settlement of claim for compensation re depositing of garbage on Mrs. Hart's Land was ordered to be attended to.

The Engineer's report which contained a review of the past week's work was read.

The sprinkling problem was briefly discussed and some remedies were considered necessary, to which the Engineer will attend.

Mr. Harris again called attention to practice of throwing waste paper in the streets and to the condition of the sidewalks. Both matters will be attended to.

Mr. Morris requested that a rail be placed at the north side of the Long Bridge for the safety of the public. It will be attended to.

The Chairman then announced that a meeting will be held on Monday night to consider the matter of sewerage, after which the meeting adjourned at 5.45 p.m.
