War News.

Messages Received Previous to 9 A.M.

OFFICIAL.

LONDON, Feb. 24.
The Admiralty reports the Dardan-
elles operations interrupted owing to
unfavorable weather. The bombard-
ment on the 19th seriously damaged
the outer forts.

The armed merchant cruiser Clan
MacNaughton, missing since third
February, was, it is feared, lost dur-
ing the bad weather then prevalent.

A German submarine attacked the
Folkestone-Boulogne boat near Bou-
logne on Monday night, the torpedo
passing thirty yards from the ship.
The passengers numbered ninety-two.
All were civilians, including some
neutrals.

Sir John French reports that the
enemy continues active near Ypres,
and exploded one of our trenches. On
the morning of the 21st, we captured
and blew up an enemy's trench near
Givency.

The French Government reports a
violent bombardment of Rheims, the
Cathedral suffering seriously. The
French have captured more trenches
near Beaumont.

The Russian Government reports
fighting on all fronts, with heavy
German and Austrian losses at sev-
eral points in the Carpathians. About
48,000 Austrians and 135 guns and
machine guns were captured during
the last month.

ST. PIERRE BULLETIN.

PARIS, via St. Pierre, Feb. 24.
West of Lombaertzyde the German
infantry twice prepared to attack us,
but was hindered from doing so by
the intensity of our fire. The bom-

**T. J. Edens**

of the American steamer Carib, re-

#### SMALL STEAMER TORPEDOED.

**EASTBOURNE, Feb. 24.**  
The steamer Roy Perana was sunk  
off this port to-day. It is believed  
she was torpedoed. The crew of 31  
was saved. Maritime records make  
no mention of the Roy Perana, which  
was a small coasting steamer. East-  
bourne is in the English Channel, in  
which German submarines have been  
particularly active since the naval  
war zone was established by Ger-  
many.

#### ANOTHER BRITISH SHIP TOR- PEDOED.

**DOVER, Feb. 24.**  
The British steamer Oakley, of  
West Hartlepool, was torpedoed and  
sunk by a German submarine in the  
English Channel, off Folkestone, to-  
day. The crew landed. The Oakley  
was not far from the Folkestone pier  
when she was attacked, indicating  
that German submarine attacks are  
becoming more bold. The Oakley was  
destroyed in the lane used by British  
transports crossing the Channel from  
Folkestone.

#### ANOTHER TORPEDOED.

**NEWHAVEN, Eng., Feb. 24.**  
Eighteen members of the crew of  
the Cardiff steamer Branksome Chine,  
a Government collier, were landed  
here. The vessel was torpedoed in  
the English Channel, 20 miles south-  
east of Beachy Head. The men say  
the captain and mate of the steamer  
are standing by the vessel which is  
badly damaged. All hope of the ves-  
sel has been abandoned, as she should  
have reached Dover several hours  
ago, if she had managed to keep  
afloat.

#### GERMAN SUBMARINE SUNK.

**PARIS, Feb. 24.**  
The French Minister of Marine an-  
nounced to-day receipt of definite in-  
formation that the German submarine  
which attacked the Channel steamer  
Victoria on Monday night, was later  
sunk by a French torpedo boat. The  
submarine is believed to be the U-16  
which had been attacking merchant  
ships in the Channel all the week.  
She was sunk off Cape Allbrech near  
Boulogne.

#### THREE AVIATORS MISSING.

**LONDON, Feb. 24.**  
Three aviators, who took part in the  
raid directed against the German  
positions in Belgium, are missing,  
according to a statement issued to-  
night by the Official Bureau.

#### GERMANY'S LOSSES.

**PARIS, Feb. 24.**  
At least 500,000 men were lost by  
Germany in their attack on the Rus-  
sian positions on the Rawa River  
and in the region of Borjimev and  
Gumbinnen, according to Ludevic  
Naudeau, a journal correspondent,  
who witnessed the operations. He  
considers the situation highly favor-  
able to the Russians, and says the  
Germans are being gradually, but im-  
placably, worn down. Whether they  
attack or merely defend themselves,  
their armies melt away from day to  
day. Their feverish activity and their  
frightful sacrifice of lives show they  
realize they are fighting against time.

#### GERMAN EAST AFRICA BLOCK- ADED.

**PARIS, Feb. 24.**  
The Governments of France and  
Britain have caused notice to be serv-  
ed on the Governor of German East  
Africa of a naval blockade, begin-  
ning Feb. 28th. Four days' notice  
will thus be allowed to neutral ships,  
in which to leave the blockade zone.

#### THE ROMANIAN ARMY.

#### ITALY CAUSING ANXIETY.

**BERLIN, Feb. 24.**  
A sudden change in the feeling con-  
cerning the attitude of Italy, has been  
noticeable in diplomatic quarters  
here during the last few days. The  
position of Italy appears to have be-  
come a matter of much greater con-  
cern. The reason for this change is  
not clear at this time.

#### LORD BEREFSFORD'S PROPOSAL.

**LONDON, Feb. 24.**  
Lord Beresford will propose to Pre-  
mier Asquith in Parliament to-mor-  
row that all German vessels caught in the  
act of sinking undefended vessels  
without an attempt at rescue, shall be  
publicly hanged as pirates, according  
to universal practice.

#### FOOD CARGO CAPTURED.

**MONTEVIDEO, Feb. 24.**  
The German steamer Gatha, loaded  
with provisions for the German aux-  
iliary cruiser Kronprinz Wilhelm, has  
been captured by a British cruiser,  
according to reliable advices, and tak-  
en to the Falkland Islands.

#### RESULTS OF BLOCKADE.

**LONDON, Feb. 24.**  
The German blockade of the Brit-  
ish Isles has been effective for a week  
with the result that so far as is  
known two Norwegian, one French  
and five British steamers have been  
sunk or torpedoed by submarines,  
with the surprisingly small loss of  
four lives. Two of these steamers,  
the Belridge and Dinorah, succeeded  
in reaching port. On the other side  
of the account, it is reported that two  
German submarines are missing, and  
that a third had been hit and possibly  
sunk by a French destroyer. Besides  
these vessels which fell victims to  
submarines, two American and one  
Norwegian steamer have been sunk  
by mines in the North Sea. The  
Swedish steamer Specia and one or  
two British steamers are overdue, and  
it is feared they have been lost with  
their crews. In almost every case  
the steamer sunk by the submarine  
was a small, slow vessel. At least  
three steamers were caught while at  
anchor, or while they were barely un-  
der way. This, with the failure of the  
submarine to hit a fast Cross-Channel  
steamer at which it fired a torpedo  
apparently proves to the satisfaction  
of the British naval writers that stea-  
mers with moderate speed, which ob-  
serve precautions, can invariably es-  
cape underwater craft. The blockade  
however, has had the effect of in-  
creasing the insurance rates, and  
some owners are keeping their ships  
in neutral waters. With conditions  
such as these the public both in Eng-  
land and neutral countries are natu-  
rally curious as to the latest proposal  
of the American Government to Brit-  
ain and Germany, of which little has  
been allowed to leak out either in  
London or Berlin, and also to the  
Allies reply to the German's blockade.  
In addition to the loss of the above-  
mentioned merchantmen, the British  
Admiralty has been impelled to give  
up hope for the armed steamer Clan  
MacNaughton, which has not been  
heard from since Feb. 3rd.
