An unsucessful search has been made, and wreckage, supposed to be portions of this ship, has since been discovered The last signal received from her was made on the morning of Feb. 3, and it is feared she was lost during the bad weather which prevailed at that time The Clan MacNaughton was built at Glasgow in 1911. She has been in the Indian service, for she reached London from Calcutta on Nov. 4th last year. She was owned by Cayzen Irvine and Co., of Glasgow. Two hundred and eighty lives were lost when she went down. Among her crew were 0 men of the Newfoundland Roya Naval Reserve. Twenty officers and two hundred and sixty men were on board.
