

# War News.

### Messages Received Previous to 9 A.M.

**OFFICIAL.**

LONDON, Jan. 12. The Governor, Newfoundland, reports the capture of Mount Lovchen. Montenegrins report that the struggle continues with extreme fierceness; and also that on the northern and eastern fronts the Montenegrins have driven back the Austrians near Berane.

General Aspinwall reports the Turks sent to a position six miles east of Kut el Amara, whether they fled precipitately from the Sheikh Saad battlefield.

British headquarters in France report considerable artillery activity on both sides about Halluch and Ypres. Yesterday our fire was particularly effective near Armentieres and St. Eloi. Russians report no change.

### GIVEN PERMISSION TO PROCEED TO AMERICA.

LONDON, Jan. 12. The Daily Express says to-day that Andrew J. Betha, Lieut. Governor of South Carolina and a companion from the Ford Peace Party, who have been detained at Tilburg opposite Gravesend, having satisfied the British authorities that they have no intention to prosecute a peace campaign in England, have been given permission to proceed to America, and will take the first boat available.

### RUSSIAN GRAND DUKE VISITS TOKIO.

TOKIO, Japan, Jan. 12. There is much interest here in the fortnight visit of the Russian Grand Duke Michael Osvitch, who has come to Tokyo to convey the congratulations of Emperor Nicholas to Emperor Yoshihito on the latter's coronation. The public regards the visit as the sealing of the friendship of Russia and Japan based on mutual interests and hopes are expressed in high quarters that the war alliance now in operation will merge into a formal alliance between the two countries.

### AWARDED THE D.S.O.

LONDON, Jan. 12. (Toronto Globe). The Official Gazette states that Lieut.-Col. Commandant Kenneth Duff Dumbear has been awarded the Distinguished Service Order for the torpedoing of a German auxiliary vessel protected by a screen of small craft, on Dec. 22nd. This is the first news of the exploit that has reached the public.

### LARGE NUMBER OF PRISONERS TAKEN BY RUSSIANS.

PETROGRAD, Jan. 12. From a correspondent of the Daily Telegraph, according to a private message from Kiev, the number of prisoners taken by the Russians in the last three weeks' fighting is much greater than was supposed from the

### LOSSES ON ALL FRONTS.

NEW YORK, Jan. 12. A News Agency cable from London says: Infantry losses on all fronts now average 15 per cent. monthly. Under Secretary for War, Tennant, informed the Commons this afternoon, in explaining why the Government found it necessary to adopt conscription. "These figures take into account the soldiers relieved from duty because of wounds, but who afterwards recover and return to the front."

### WITHDRAW THEIR RESIGNATIONS.

LONDON, Jan. 12. The resignations from the Ministry of Labor members, Arthur Henderson, President of the Board of Education, William Bruce and Geo. H. Roberts, respectively Parliamentary Under Secretary for Home Affairs, and Lord Commissioner of the Treasury, have been withdrawn. The Labor members had a long conference with Premier Asquith at his invitation, when he gave them assurances that the Government was hiding no ulterior motives behind the Military Service Bill. It was later officially announced that in view of this fact, the whole matter will be considered at the Party's annual conference at Bristol, at the end of January, and it had been decided to withdraw the resignations of Messrs. Henderson, Bruce and Roberts for the time being.

### ANDERSON'S MOTION DEFEATED.

LONDON, Jan. 12. The House defeated William C. Anderson's motion to reject the Military Service Bill, by a vote of 491 to 26. The second reading was agreed to without division.

### WILL SAFEGUARD EMPLOYEES.

LONDON, Jan. 12. As a concession to the Labor opposition to conscription, Premier Asquith announced in the Commons to-day the Government will introduce an amendment preventing employers from using the measure as a weapon against employees.

### STEAMER SUNK.

NEW YORK, Jan. 12. A News Agency despatch from Leith Scotland, to-day, says the steamer Yaquir has been sunk by a submarine. The crew was saved.

### CANADIAN MAILS.

LONDON, Jan. 12. Replying to a question in the Commons, the Postmaster General stated that mails brought by Canadian packers are, whenever possible, landed at the first port of call. In a few instances it has been necessary, owing to Admiralty requirements, to carry them on to the port of destination.

### RELATIONS ARE GOOD!

BERLIN, Jan. 12. Despatches from Sofia, says the Overseas News Agency, report that the Greek Government has asked the Entente Powers to withdraw restrictions upon trade with Greece, ports, M. Toncheff, the Bulgarian Minister of Finance, states that the relations between Greece and Bulgaria are excellent and that relations with Roumania likewise are good.

### HEAVY CANNONING HEARD.

PARIS, Jan. 12. Heavy cannoning was heard during the day from the direction of Doiran across the northern Greek border, says a Havas despatch from Athens, under Tuesday's date. Apparently an artillery duel was in progress, says the correspondent, but no official communication that this was the case, was received.

### BRITISH STEAMER ESCAPES SUB-MARINE.

NEW YORK, Jan. 12. A News Agency despatch from Barcelona to-day, says that the British steamer Taina eluded a German submarine that pursued her several miles in the Mediterranean, and arrived here to-day. The Taina is the largest of fifteen ships owned by the English and American Shipping Co. of London. She displaces 4,385 tons.

### INDICTED FOR CONSPIRACY.

SAN ANTONIO, Texas, Jan. 12. General Victoriano Huerta, former purchasing agent, Jose B. Rattner, and ten others were indicted here late to-day by the Federal Grand Jury for conspiracy to violate neutrality laws.

### JESSE WILLARD TO FIGHT AGAIN.

NEW YORK, Jan. 12. Jesse Willard, world's heavy weight champion, and Frank Moran, have been matched here on March 11 for a purse of \$45,000.

### Arrival Not Yet Reported.

No word of the steamers Bellavente and Adventure reaching Archangel, Russia, has yet been received. Their arrival at Alexandrovsk from here was reported recently. It is presumed that they have got to their destination ere this. As previously reported, John Connolly, who was a fireman on board the Bellavente, died during the passage and just before entering Alexandrovsk. Particulars of his death are not yet to hand, though it is thought heart failure was the cause.

### Frenchmen Decorated by General.

Paris, Jan. 6.—Four companies of infantry paraded and formed a square in the great Quadrangle of the Invalides to-day, arms were presented and trumpets sounded as General Camille Cousins in the name of the French Government bestowed crosses of the legion of honor, "crosses of war and military medals upon upwards of one hundred soldiers. Each decoration was given for some unusual act of gallantry.

Standing at one side were widows, orphans, fathers and mothers of soldiers who had fallen and whose deeds were recognized by declaration after their death. The crosses and medals were presented to the kinspeople of these soldiers. General Cousins addressed words of consolation to each and affectionately embraced the children.
