of personal influence. The touch of a personality will often abide when the voice is silent. The speaker paid a great tribute to Norman McLeod, the favourite preacher of Queen Victoria. A biography every preacher should read. His last point was the multiplication of influence. Here he described the great Charles H. Spurgeon going to a service with nothing to say. At the last moment he turned to a gentleman on the platform and told him he was hard up for a subject. His friend gave him the multiplication table. The theme was adequate for the occasion. Spurgeon talked on the increase by addition, division, substraction, multiplication. The two forms of christian contact were the culminating thoughts of the address: 1, The extensive, coming in contact with the multitudes; 2, The intensive, as the Master himself came in contact with his twelve disciples. The doctor diffused at tim in the course of his remarks a degree of pathos that brought smiles and tears. The Congregational friends are indeed happy in having such a preacher to administer to their spiritual needs.
