Exactly fifty-one years passed since the death of Charles Dickens at Gad's Hill on June 3, 1870. Born at Portsea in 1812, he had been famous ever since the publication of the "Pickwick Papers," which he began in April, 1836, and, in addition to many novels, he had founded and enited "Household Words" and "All the Year Round." In his later years he was very successful as a public reader of his own works. Although very profitable, these reading hours over-taxed his strength, and his health, shaken by a railway accident, had been further impaired by the strain of his second American visit in 1867-8. He remained busy to the last, for, on the day of his fatal selzure, he had been engaged upon the unfinished "Mystery of Edwin Drood." in the Swiss chalet presented to him by the French actor, Fechter, and set up in the grounds of Gad's Hill.
