### What of the Fishery?

The chief asset of Newfoundland is the codfishery, both Shore, Labrador and Bank, and failing the prosecution of all three, as of yore, the prospects of the voyage do not promise large catches to be taken into account as revenue producers. So far as conditions go there are very few merchants who will undertake to furnish outfits to fishermen, unless they are promised a guarantee against probable loss on collections by the Government. Already the latter have taken up the burden of a portion of the population of the island, and with sympathy which was not at all expected, has responded to the appeal made by the voters of the district of Placentia and St. Mary's, through the representatives of that section, and has stood behind the financial aspect of credit supplies for the fishermen of Placentia, St. Mary's and Trepassy Bays. What is the actual reason behind this guarantee? Are not other districts equally entitled to similar consideration?

There can be no invidious distinction on the part of a Government, for a Government is of all the people, not a portion. If one district is given consideration in a matter which affects others, then all alike should partake of Governmental favor. Eighty-five per cent. of the produce of Newfoundland is derived from the fisheries, consequently an equal ratio of the purchasing power of the people comes from the same source. In order to raise a customs revenue it is necessary that the complete and full resources of the colony be utilized. One section alone cannot become the furnisher of the sum necessary to carry on the internal economy of the colony. All are contributors towards that end. It stands to reason, therefore, that if it is the intention or wish of the Government to encourage and stimulate production, there must be no discrimination. All suppliers must receive fair and equitable treatment. One section of the country cannot profit at the expense of the others. The argument then is that all must receive equal rights. If the Government is intending to go into the supplying business, all the people must be taken into account. If not, trouble of a most complicated kind will ensue, naturally to the disadvantage and confusion of the administration. There can be no half measures. Having taken the first step, the party in power must give consideration to the whole population, not a section of it.

The codfishery has to be prosecuted. The success or failure of the country depends on the result of the voyage. If merchants cannot issue supplies, as in the past, then it is the immediate duty of the powers that be to do so; but in so doing they must remember that they are not for one section alone. The whole country is theirs. The zeal with which they plunged into the Placentia and St. Mary's situation can be simulated by the warmth of their regard for Northern and extra-Western districts, particularly those which have been praying for assistance through the House of Assembly. Harris, Limited, asks for half a million dollars to aid them in continuing the issuance of fishing supplies. The position of this firm is that it has been ruined by Government interference, at the instance of Mr. Coaker. It does not need the importation of private detectives to prove that claim, but if the Prime Minister is not satisfied with the statement of Harris, Limited, it is only for him to send a couple of those fa-

mous chartered accountants of his to examine their books, and report upon their actual losses made by the imposition of Sales Control at the instance of the one man whom he had not the moral courage to defy. In the meantime what of the fisheries and the fishery supplies? A Government guarantee stands for all. Is it the intention of Sir R. A. Squires to discriminate against sections other than Placentia and St. Mary's? The answer must be forthcoming quickly.

The Ellis Boat sails at the first opportunity. The fishermen of St. Anthony and vicinity, no doubt, are fortunate in having a firm willing to give them the means of earning a livelihood.
