A GOOD SERVICE DRESS FOR SLENDER OR STOUT FIGURES.

4162. Comfortable fullness and slendering lines mark this desirable model. The back extends over the fronts to form yoke sections to which the fronts are gathered. This is a good style for percale, gingham, gabardine, and flannelette. The sleeve may be in wrist length or short, as illustrated.

The Pattern is cut in 7 sizes: 38, 38, 40, 42, 44, 46 and 48 inches bust measure. A 38 inch size requires 6 1/2 yards of 32 inch material. The width at the foot is 2 1/2 yards.

Obituary.

GUSTAVUS H. DICKINSON.

It is with feelings of profound regret that the Telegram chronicles today the passing of one of our most prominent citizens, in the person of Mr. Gustavus Dickinson, who died at the home of his son-in-law, Mr. Earl S. Pinsent at 2 p.m. yesterday, after an illness of only ten days duration. The deceased who had reached the allotted span of three score years and last, was for many years prominently identified in the trade of this country, having, until the year 1892, carried on an extensive business, founded by his father, the late Henry King Dickinson. He retired from the business life of the community only a few years ago, having conducted a Commission Agency on Water Street. The late Mr. Dickinson received his early schooling at Newton-Abbott College, and on returning to his native land entered the office of Walter Grieve & Co., subsequently joining his father. His mother was a native of Waterford in Ireland, and his father, a Lieut.-Col. of the Newfoundland Volunteers. His wife, who predeceased him several years ago, was a sister of the late Hon. J. S. Pitts. There survive, one son, Mr. Harry Dickinson, principal of the firm of H. W. Dickinson & Co., and two daughters, Mrs. Peter Duff and Mrs. Earl S. Pinsent, besides four grandchildren. The memory of Miss Ethel Dickinson, a daughter, whose devoted courage and sacrificial service, has been held in admiration and gratitude, stands perpetuated in the monument which has been erected to her heroic service in time of stress. Deceased was well known in athletic circles, and in his younger days was a walker of repute, whilst at swimming and rifle shooting he had few superiors. The funeral will take place tomorrow afternoon at 2.30 o'clock, from the residence of Mr. Earl Pinsent, Circular Road.

Complaint From Conception Bay.

(Hr. Grace Standard.)

The steamer "Senef" left St. John's direct for Labrador on Monday. Last Friday it was reported that she would make another trip to the coast, and advertisements in the daily papers on Saturday stated that she was to leave that evening on the trip. The trip will take in the North East Coast and Labrador, her trip to Labrador closing steamer connections for this year. Several Labrador dealers here and a number of others had freight and mail to send to the coast ready, on the supposition that she would call here, but the authorities did not consider the convenience nor the need of touching at any port south of Cook's Harbor. A quantity of freight, food and perishable articles was left here, and those who have been inconvenienced by her not calling are aggrieved and are expressing their dissatisfaction. Had notice of the steamer's going direct from St. John's been given, the mail and freight could have been dispatched to St. John's in time to reach her, the steamer being held a few hours for it if necessary. Evidently those responsible for the steamer's passing ports between St. John's and Cook's Harbor did not consider the needs of the other places, and their action is criticized. The Labrador trade is not altogether centered in St. John's, there are other places that have trade relations with the people on the coast. It may be a small thing to comment upon this passing over of the needs and requirements of others outside of St. John's should be given, at least, a little consideration part of the time.
