On his death it was placed in the mausoleum which he had raised on the spot where one of his preachers fortunately discovered the tomb of Eyub in time to inspire the janissaries with fanatic courage for their last victorious assault on the walls of the city. The Chelebi first read the short opening chapter of the Khoran and invoked the Divine blessing on the Caliph. Then he lifted the sword from the stool and girt it on, with a brief prayer that he on whom it was girt might bear it to the glory of God and the advantage of Islam. Thereupon the notables departed, and the Caliph was left alone in prayer before the tomb. 
