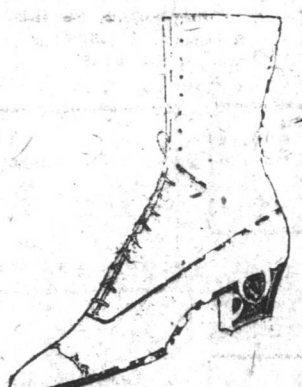

### Fight for Fortune.

NEW YORK CAPITALIST SUED BY FORMER WIFE — DIVORCE SEQUEL.

Mrs. Edith Kelly Gould, the divorced wife of Mr. Frank J. Gould, the New York capitalist, has served papers for an action which will be tried in the Versailles courts, in which she claims one-half of Mr. Gould's fortune as community property, and asks for an immediate sale of his real estate in France.

This estate is valued at about \$4,200,000, and she claims that the proceeds of the sale be divided between her and Mr. Gould.

The suit is being brought under the principle of "community" in French law, whereby, unless previous to marriage a contract specifying otherwise has been made, in the event of a separation, one-half of the property goes to the wife and the other half becomes the husband's.

Mrs. Gould was divorced at Versailles in 1919, and under the decree she received no alimony. This decision was confirmed last month by the New York courts.
