IN THE REALMS OF SPORT

LAST NIGHT'S GAME.

Guards 3; Felldians 1.

The football game last night, between the Felldians and the Guards, had been awaited with interest, as both teams are strong aggregations and the result of their clash was pure conjecture. The Guards won by a margin of two goals and it must be conceded that this was due to the more effective measures they adopted throughout.

First Half

The Felldians, with the wind and sun in their favor, pressed the Guards during the early part of the game, but were weak on the goal. After four minutes of play, however, J. Withers sent Joyce a beauty which, travelling low and with the speed of a shell, hit the boards behind the goalkeeper with a resounding whack. They were back again almost as soon as the ball was centred and the Guards defence were for some minutes hard put to it to keep them out. Several fine shots were made, one of which hit the crossbar, but it failed to materialize. Then came the Guards rally and Voisey, in the Felldian goal, and the backs, had a busy time. Again and again their attack was beaten back but eventually W. Halfyard, playing left half, sent in a shot which passed just under the crossbar and the score was equalized after twenty minutes of play.

Second Half

The sun had for the most part disappeared and the wind had dropped slightly when the ball was again centered and play opened with a strong attack by the Guards, but was repulsed, Morris and Dawe putting up an able defence. In one of these attacks, which resulted in a melee round the goal, a foul was given against Voisey and matters looked serious. The free kick, however, bounded out of danger, and the close call seemed to awaken the Felldians, and from then to the finish they put far more fight into their play. Several times they made their way west, but to no effect. Ellis and Halfyard, the defence, were ready for all attacks and their forwards were equally on the alert to attack. About twenty minutes passed before any scoring took place, when Nelson Halfyard sent Voisey a slow one along the ground, which he misjudged and the Guards secured the lead. Just before the close a drop shot was just deflected by Macklin and skimming the bar, landed safely in the net. No further scoring took place and the game ended as already stated.
